CUBA MUST BE FREE

Nothing Less Will Do for President McKinley and His Advisors, Say the Reports from Washington.

Washington, D.C., April 4.—The two foreign branches of the Cuban question in Washington today were the President's message and European mediation, which now has taken an active form in the courts of Europe, according to advices received at foreign embassies here, though no official has been made to the United States.

Members of Mr. McKinley's Cabinet and his friends in Congress stated definitely today that it will deal vigorously with the question of Cuban independence.

THE WEARING OF THE GREEN

AS TO MEDIATION

Communications Have Passed Between the Vatican and American Demands Excessive.

Rome, April 4.—The Vatican refuses to publish the text of the communications which have passed between the Pontiff and the United States, but the statement that His Holiness has asked Spain to arrange for a suspension of hostilities in Cuba is confirmed.

MINES MADE FOR SPAIN

London, April 4.—Details have been obtained by the Associated Press of the manufacture of submarine mines in London for Spain, which was first brought to the attention of the United States Embassy and cabled to the Associated Press on March 5.

The delay in the construction of French demands is attributed to English opposition and the lack of Russian support."
