THE 'HIGHLANDERS' TRIP. It is Now Said That Lieut.-Col. Cosby Made the Request to Gen. Roe That They Be Allowed TO MARCH IN THE DEWEY PARADE.

Americans Were at First Dubious About It, But Now They Are Disappointed.

New York, Sept. 26.—The Journal to-day, referring to the refusal of Major-General Hutton to countenance the parade of the Highlanders to this city to take part in the parade, says:

"The firm belief that anyone in New York had that the Toronto Highlanders were to be part of the land parade in Admiral Dewey's honor came about a fortnight ago to General Roe in the form of a request from their commander, Col. Cosby, that they be allowed to march in the parade."

"In his note, Col. Cosby said that the members of his regiment were all great admirers of the hero of Manila, and that they desired the privilege of marching behind him in his glorious triumph."

"Men who are ardent for Dewey's reputation were a trifle dubious at first about inviting the Highlanders, but they were essentially national in their character, and out that they would be the only foreign troops in a parade that was destined to be a tribute to the hero of Manila."

"But the action of the Highlanders seemed promptly by the committee to know America's hero that opposition melted away, and at the last meeting of the Plan and Scope Committee General Roe said:

"I wish to set at rest all doubts on the subject of the Toronto Highlanders, and glad to announce that they will participate in the parade. I have assigned them a place near the head of the procession, directly behind the Olympia's crew."

"General Hutton's order was a keen disappointment to almost everyone except the 'volunteers.' By a coincidence, almost at the same time that the Highlanders in Toronto were receiving their stay-at-home orders from the committee, the Irish volunteers were holding a meeting at Fernando's Hall, on East Fifty-fifth street, in this city, yesterday, and their stay-at-home order was a power friendly to the British Empire."

The 48th Highlanders will parade on Friday night next at Armouries at the usual hour.

One Consolation. There is no foundation for the rumor that several members of the Highlanders intend to sue any of the company officers for damages on the ground that the regiment has been recruited in good faith in preference to the proposed New York trip, and it was no fault of theirs that the anticipated parade was frowned upon by the powers that be. STUDENTS TO RAISE \$200,000. Victoria College Ex-Students Have a Pretty Big Contract on Their Hands.

A combined meeting of the alumni, graduates and ex-students of Victoria University was held last night in the library of the college, Queen's Park. The attendance was not large. Very few ex-students were present, and there were not more than 15 of the alumni at the meeting.

The purpose of the meeting was to consider the advisability of raising, by subscription, an additional endowment fund of \$200,000, with which to meet the pressing need of Victoria College.

At the meeting on Tuesday, the 10th, it was decided to leave the matter in abeyance until the opinion of a majority of the graduates and ex-students could be obtained by letter. The feeling of ex-students and graduates, as a whole, was in favor of replies to the circulars sent out on Friday and read last night, was evidently in favor of the movement.

The proposal which was carried at the meeting last night was that the Twentieth Century Thirtieth Anniversary fund should be raised by the graduates and ex-students of Victoria College, and that the money should be used to purchase a tract of land in the city, to be used as a site for a new building, to be known as the Victoria College Building.
