CANNERS FORMING A TRUST.

Details of Joint Stock Company
Now Being Worked Out.Ontario canners are working out the
details of a joint stock company, which looks
to control all the principal canning indus-
tries in the Province. The object of the
amalgamation is to control the output,
raise the prices and secure modified
freight rates from different points in On-
tario to the leading markets.

The scheme is under consideration at a
meeting now being held at the Walker
House. About twenty canners are pre-
sent. During the past meeting, the associa-
tion has had several meetings, and it was
decided to make an advance in the price
and endeavor to limit the output. This
had the effect of overcoming the glut in
the market, and the canners are trying to
make provision for these men. The
small canners could not afford to run
half time, and take chances of finding a
market at the increased prices agreed
upon.

"They will have to be bought out," re-
marked a large manufacturer of canned
goods, who is one of the canners trying to
form a company to buy out all the fac-
tories, operate the largest ones, and get
the best prices for their goods. The com-
pany has been in the business for the
past couple of years. The smaller ones
will be shut down, and the ones remain-
ing will be run full time.

included only the enthusiasts and the pro-
fessionals, who surrounded the ring railing
to get a close view of the judging. A. J.
Cassatt of Philadelphia and B. D. Morgan
were the Ring Committeemen for the day,
and Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., and F. K. Stur-
ges served in the capacity of clerks.

Twenty classes were on the day's pro-
gram for judgment before the experts, with
hackneys and trotters as the special fea-
tures of the morning. The blue ribbon for
Shetland brood mares went to Gladys, owned
by T. L. Watt, Jr., Frederick C. Ste-
vens, chairman of the show, was given the
best 2-year-old hackney mare, and
his Victoria IV. was awarded
the best 3-year-old hackney mare. The same owner
also won the blue ribbon in the hack-
ney brood mare class. Mrs. H. H. Blais
Hill M. was awarded the blue ribbon as
the best trotting brood mare.

T. L. Storer's 2-year-old trotting filly,
Olive, was the blue ribbon winner in the
hackney class, owned by William Pollock, took
prize as a yearling trotter. The blue ribbon
