There was a slugging match at Tecumseh Park yesterday afternoon. After the first two innings, however, the locals did most of the slugging, and the visitors were kept on the defensive. Price pitched only two games last week, and it took him a little while to steady down. While the steadying was in progress the Bains got five runs in the second inning, making one better than the locals' tally in the first inning. These five runs were got by means of a single, two men hit by pitched balls, a bad fumble by Mohler, a three-bagger by Dark, and a poor throw by Babbitt. But for Frank's phenomenal throw in from right field to the plate, the visitors would have tallied yet another. A three-bagger by Busse and Pickard's out in right field gave them their final run in the third inning.

The Cockneys got right after Thompson on the start, and kept him going. Everybody but Cope made one hit or more. In the first Mohler, McFadden and Jones made singles. Jones made a three-bagger, Howell sacrificed, and Babbitt drew a charity. Net result—four runs, all of which were tallied after two men were out.

Bases on balls to Howell and Babbitt, and a single by McFadden were converted into runs by Jones' three-bagger in the second. Jones also scoring on Dark's miff of Cope's long fly to center. A base on balls and two singles were made good for two more runs in the fourth. In the sixth Howell led off with a three-bagger, but was left on third, the next three men up going out in succession.

The Cockneys' seventh inning was a slaughter. Cope fled out to right field; Frank singled; Schwartz hit to left, and reached first safely, because Tip-ton, the shortstop failed to hold the ball, which properly belonged to Martin; Price drew a pass, Mohler sacrificed; Howell lifted the ball over the track at center field, and took three bases, while Frank, Schwartz and Price walked home. Howell tallied on McFadden's single. Then Babbitt placed

the ball back of the signboard fence, taking three bases easily, and as the ball bounded over O'Brien's head on the return, Babbitt kept going and tallied a home run.

The Bains' fielding was pretty sharp, and several of the Cockneys were retired in foolish attempts to steal bases as mere bravado. Score:
