U. S. Naval and Military Forces at Manila Acting in Concert.

Disorders in Havana-One Man Killed and Others Wounded in Affrays-Many Burglaries-A Talk With

Washington, Dec. 27.-The administration has taken steps to safeguard American interests at Iloilo, in the Island of Panay, one of the Philippine Archipelago, and a military and naval expedition is on its way there from Manila. Cable advices were received here today from Gen Otis, commanding the military forces in the Philippines, and Admiral Dewey, commanding the naval forces there, showing that they are acting in concert in the matter. Gen. Otis reported that he had dispatched two regiments and a battery of artillery to lioilo on army transports, and Admiral Dewey notified the navy department that the cruiser Baltimore had sailed from Manila for the same place. It is explained that these officers are acting on their own discretion in the matter, and that no official advices have been received here to indicate that there is any unusual lawlessness at Iloilo. Several days ago it was reported by way of Madrid that the Spanish forces in Iloilo had been attacked by the insurgents and had driven them back with heavy loss, but this report lacks official confirmation. The United States expedition is more in the nature of a precaution, but will take active measures for the suppres-sion of lawlessness in case the condition of affairs require it.

DISORDERS IN HAVANA. Havana, Dec. 27 .- Francis Quintero, Spanish guerilla, while walking along Gonios street yesterday, was fired at from the roof of a house and severely wounded. During the 24 hours one man has been killed and twelve have been wounded in affrays in different Of the City of London parts of the city, and eleven burglaries have been committed. The city is in a state of unrest. A party of colored Cubans entered a wholesale grocery and clothing establishment, owned by the Spanish firm of Mestra & Mata, and ordered Senor Mestro to kiss the Cuban flag and to cry "Vive Cuba libre!" He refused to obey, when one of the Cu-bans cut his head badly with a ma-

> PEACE COMMISSIONER FRYE'S VIEWS.

Washington, Dec. 27.-Senator Frye talked to a reporter with respect to the conditions attending and resulting from the peace negotiations. With respect to the frequently repeated statement in press dispatches that the sentiment of the powers, with the exception of England, looked with disfavor on the attitude of the American Government in dealing with Spain, Senator Frye said: "I saw no evidence of such sentiment existing outside of France, and in France that sentiment appeared to be confined to the press, which does not reflect the sentiment of the nation, nor of the people generally. I think that very soon after the ratification of the peace treaty and the restoration of diplomatic relations, there will be no difficulty about negotiating commercial treaties and a treaty for the release of prisoners and such other matters directed toward the perfect restoration of friendly relations between the two governments of Spain and the United

ERYTHREA. Rome, Dec. 27.-A group of English capitalists has just concluded an agree-ment with the Italian Government, according to the terms of which the syndicate receives the lease of the entire Italian colony on the Red Sea and African coast, known as Erythrea, for term of twenty years. The syndicate undertakes to pay the Italian Government an annuity of \$1,000,000, besides a royalty on the net profits of the en-terprise. The syndicate undertakes the maintenance of order in the colony, as well as its defense against foreign invasion, and likewise the construction of a line of railroads from the Red Sea port of Massowah to Khartoum. The scheme, in which several Italian capitalists are interested, meets with universal approval here.

SEE THE PRINCE

A Crank Forces His Way to St. James Palace.

Indignation Meeting of British Subjects at Johannesburg.

Rumors of Another Military Plot in Paris-Zola's Escape to London-Premier Sagasta's Condition Very Serious-The Czar's Peace Confer-

London, Dec. 27 .- A crank, who said he was the bearer of a message from the Saviour to the Prince of Wales, forced an entrance to St. James Palace on Sunday evening. The attendants saw that they had to deal with a madman, and tried to get him to leave quietly. The man insisted that he must see the prince, and he was only stopped when he was threatened with a loaded rifle. Then he became violent. The police were summoned, and it took eight of them to bind the intruder, who fought desperately. After he was bound he was placed in an ambulance and conveyed to a police station. Physicians pronounced him a lunatic.

ZOLA'S ESCAPE.

The Paris correspondent of the Times gives an interesting account this morning of the way in which M. Emile Zola escaped to London after the sentences imposed upon him last July in the trial on the charge of libel brought against him and M. Perrieux, managing editor of the Aurore, by the officers of the Esterhazy court-martial. According to M. Blowitz, M. Zola has lived at various country places in England quietly ever since. It appears that his Paris friends had the greatest difficulty to persuade him to seek refuge in England, the course they considered best for the interests of the Dreyfus revision.

PLOTTING IN PARIS.

The Paris correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: It is asserted that the French Government have seized several bundles of letters, whose contents prove that a military plot is already in thor-

ough working order. M. Loew, president of the criminal chamber of the court of cassation, spent two hours at the ministry of the interior yesterday afternoon, taking the testimony of M. Dupuy, the premier, in the Dreyfus case.

INDIGNANT BRITONS.

A dispatch from Johannesburg says: A mass meeting was held here yesterday to protest against the recent murder of an Englishman named Edgar by a policeman. Five thousand persons were present. There were no speeches made, owing to the Transvaal law forbidding political gatherings. Copies of an appeal to Queen Victoria for the protection of British subjects in the Transvaal were circulated, and a deputation was appointed to carry a copy to the British consul. A reference to Jones, the policeman who did the killing, led to cries of "Lynch him!" The authorities were apprehensive of trouble, and 200 extra police from Pretoria occupied a fort commanding the town. Feeling ran so high that the government officials took refuge in the postoffice, but the disorder extended no further than a few street collisions. The mounted police paraded the town in groups in the evening. Jones, who, after being arrested, was released on bail, has again been taken into custody. Bail has been refused, and he will remain in jail until he is tried.

THE CZAR'S PEACE COMMISSION. London, Dec. 27 .- The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says: The conference, based upon the disarma-ment proposals of Emperor Nicholas, has been fixed for St. Petersburg about the beginning of May next, prior to which the Russian Government will submit officially to the powers a definite plan of disarmament in order to enable them to formulate modifications or counter suggestions.

NO FIGHT.

Owing to the failure of the seconds to agree upon conditions, it has been decided to abandon the proposed duel between Baron Banffy, the Hungarian premier, and Deputy Herranky, of the opposition, in the Lower House of the Hungarian parliament, who, in the course of last Friday's debate, called the premier an imposter, cheat and
