IMMIGRATION CHECKED

Ottawa, Jan. 12.-The new regulation regarding immigration will have the effect of limiting arrivals at Atlantic ports to those of British, French and Belgian nationalities. Emigrants from the continent of Europe cannot come to Canada via British ports. They must depart from the country of their nationality or adoption, and as there are only two steamship lines running to Canada from continental ports, Antwerp and Havre, this will confine continental emigration for the present, as stated, to Belgians and French. On the Pacific side, the effect will be to stop Japanese immigration by way of Hawaii, and Hindoo immigrants via Hong Kong, the two routes of which the Asiatics have taken the fullest advantage. Japanese can, of course, come direct from Japan, but Hindoo immigration will be stopped altogether, as there is no direct steamship line between Calcutta and Vancouver.
