The air fighting resulted in the destruction of 48 enemy machines while 17 others were driven down out of control. Fifty British machines did not return.

During the six succeeding days 185



## KAISER SANCTIONS PRINCE'S EXPULSION

Washington, D. C., Aug. 17.—The German emperor has given his sanction to the decision of the Prussian House of Lords in voting to expel Prince Lichnowsky, the German ambassador to England at the outbreak of the war, who in a series of memoirs has declared that the war cannot be laid at the doors of Great Britain, France or Russia, but was the direct outgrowth of carefully-laid plans of the German militaryafic ruling class, according to a dispatch received here today.
