Chicago, Sept. 26.—Absence of buying orders led to considerable weakness in the corn market today. Besides, there was liquidation on the part of holders, especially in the September delivery. Strength in foreign exchange had no apparent effect on grain values. Opening prices, which varied from the same as yesterday's finish to 4½c lower, with December at \$1.23½@1.23¾, and May at \$1.20½@1.20¾, were followed by something of a rally in September, but additional declines in December and May.

Oats were easier with corn. After opening at ¼c decline to a like advance, including December at 68½@69½c, the market underwent a moderate general sag.

WALL STREET.
New York, Sept. 26.—Wall Street, 10:30 a.m.—Steel shares led all other issues at the opening of today's stock market, over-night developments dealing with the strike situation, evidently contributing to the strength of that group. Crucible Steel was the spectacular feature, gaining almost 3 points in the first half hour. United States Steel and Bethlehem Steel gained a point each, and equipments, oils, to motors and the food division were 1 to 5 points higher, tobacco, shipping and metals also making substantial advances. Profit-taking reduced some of the more extensive gains before the end of the first half hour.

1:30 p.m.—Trade was almost at a standstill during the mid-session, but hungers were altogether toward higher levels. Foreign shares, as represented by sugar issues, were the chief features of strength. Low-priced metals made moderate gains, and Crucible Steel extended its early advance.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE.
New York, Sept. 26.—Foreign exchange strengthened perceptibly today on the announcement from Washington of the plan to fund the interest on the debt of allied European nations.
Sterling, or bills on London, rose almost 3c to the pound, francs and lire also rallying, though more moderately. Remittances to Germany and Austria were less favorably influenced, and rates on Holland and the Scandinavian countries were little changed.
