

TURKISH TREATY IS FIRST PROBLEM ON LIST AT SAN REMO

Supreme Council Meets Today
—United States Absent.

SAN REMO, April 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Questions in connection with the peace treaty with Turkey will comprise the first business to be taken up by the supreme council of the Allies at its first formal session here tomorrow. This was decided upon at a conference today in the Duvauchan Palace, where the sessions are to be held, attended by Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain, Nitti of Italy and Millerand of France, for the arrangement of the official procedure. With the premiers were Foreign Minister Scelafos of Italy, Earl Curzon, the British foreign secretary, and General Berthelot, the French chief of staff.

It was agreed that daily communiques should be issued, as upon the occasion of previous sessions of the council.

United States Absent.

It developed definitely today that the United States would not be represented at the conference. For the present the premiers, foreign ministers and ambassadors of Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium and Greece at the meeting are occupied with problems particularly affecting themselves, and there is no disposition to dwell unduly upon the lack of American participation.

The first meeting of the conference will be opened at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Sessions will be held mornings and afternoons, with the possibility that evening sittings may even be arranged for.

Entirely Approved.

On his way to San Remo, Premier Millerand made a statement to the correspondents, in which he said that he entirely approved of the declaration of Mr. Lloyd George at Marseilles, where the British premier spoke of the necessity for the Allies remaining united.

"Unity and co-operation between France and England," said M. Millerand, "are necessary to reap the fruits of the victory we have won together. I am sure that after the viewpoints of the two Governments are clearly made known, we will find ourselves equally devoted to the maintenance of the Entente Cordiale, which prevails to the victory united us so efficaciously."

ONTARIO RESIDENTS MAY CARRY LIQUOR HOME FROM MONTREAL

Osgoode Hall Quashes Conviction of Windsor Man
Fined Recently.

WINDSOR, April 18.—Deciding that a resident in Ontario is perfectly within the law in acting as his own carrier in bringing liquor home from Montreal, Osgoode Hall has quashed an order by the local magistrate in the case of John Kozak, Windsor householder, who was recently fined \$500 and costs, and his liquor confiscated. Kozak had been in Montreal to bid farewell to some relative who were leaving for Europe, and on his return carried home with him ten gallons of whiskey in suitcases. He was apprehended on arrival here, and later convicted.

PATROL DETROIT RIVER.
Inspector Hunter of the Dominion department of marine service has been in this district for the past few days, arranging for a patrol of the Detroit River to curb the activities of rum runners who have been operating on a wide scale here for months past. Launches are to be placed in service with revenue officers by the Government in response to the recent appeal signed by mayors and police officials of the various municipalities.

USE OF ARMORIES GRANTED.
Notification was received Saturday through Lieut.-Col. Robinson by the Windsor Trades and Labor Council of permission from the Government to use the armories here for the annual convention of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress which will assemble here for a big conference on September 23. Over 2,000 delegates from all parts of the Dominion are expected to be present, and others from the United States and representatives from overseas organizations will also be in attendance. Premier Borden is slated to address the convention, in addition to a number of other notables. Accommodation of the visitors is the most perplexing question now confronting the committee in charge of arrangements, who today declared they had practically worked out a novel plan, details of which are being kept private until its success is assured.

ARRESTED AS DRUNK, COLORED MAN DIES AFTER LIBERATION

Had Just Left Revival Meeting
When Picked by Police.

WINDSOR, April 18.—An adjournment was declared Saturday night by the coroner's jury empaneled to inquire into the circumstances surrounding the death of Gordon Wall, colored, who died in Windsor police station on Friday after having been arrested on a charge of drunkenness. The inquest will convene again next Thursday night. Friends of the deceased claim he was the victim of a paralytic stroke, headed by Rev. Wells of the First Baptist Church, are planning to take action through the courts to obtain redress from the authorities.

Wall was seized on his return from a revival meeting in the B. M. E. Church, and taken to the lock-up, where he remained until 4 o'clock in the morning when a member of the force recognized him and notified his relatives. He expired at his home within an hour later.

WINTER CROPS OF WORLD PROGRESSING

ROME, April 17.—A bulletin of the International Agricultural Institute made public here announces that winter crops are making good progress in Austria, Belgium, Denmark and the United Kingdom. Parts of Italy and Algeria suffered by drought, otherwise the condition of the crops is satisfactory.

Winter wheat reports comprise about one-half the usual extent sown in the northern hemisphere, showing a decrease in the cultivated area of 7 per cent compared with last year. Spring sowing was carried out favorably in Morocco and is well advanced in Austria, Belgium, France and Ireland, and favorably commenced in Denmark, Scotland and Italy.

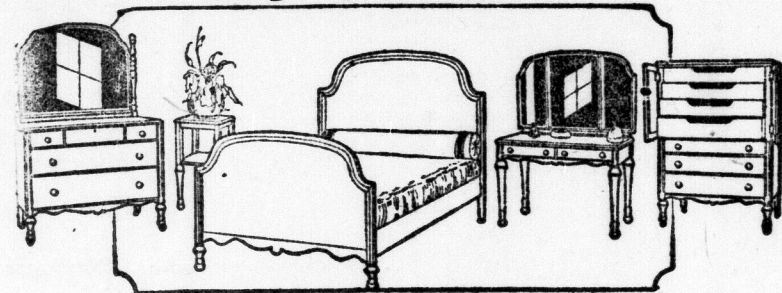
ESTATE PROBATED AT \$164,619.
