David Kelly was a highly-respected resident of Woodhouse Township, where he had spent 60 yeas of his marrived life in Doan's Hollow. He is surrived by his wife and two sons, W. C. TORONTO, Nov. 4.—Administration of justice in the Toronto police court was touched upon by the Ontario Public Service Commission here today, J. Walter Curry, K. C., a former crown attorney, suggesting super-vision of newspaper reports of police

Curry said the way the evening apers of this city made sport of the ases militated against the proper administration of justice in the police "This should be stopped," declared "This should be stopped," declared Curry.

"I would make it an offence to bring ridicule upon the accused; it lessons the dignity of the court," he added. Curry characterized the censorship of the "movies" in Toronto as a "joke." He said there were films being shown at the present time which ought not to be allowed.

W. W. Dunlop, inspector of prisons and public charities, who was a witness before the commission, admitted that many jails were in bad shape, some not having been improved in 50 years and several being 100 years old.

As to a complaint by one of the commissioners that a boy, 18 years of age, who had been sentenced for selling liquor, occupied the same corridor as two murderers and there were no partitions. Inspector Dunlop said the idea of having no partitions was to prevent prisoners from "shooting the needle into themselves" without being detected.

WILL REVISE SYSTEM OF BOOKKEEPING AT WINDSOR POLICE COURT

WINDSOR, Nov. 4.—Intimating that probe into the disappearance of early \$7,000 from the safe in police headquarters at the city hall recently would be ordered by him on his return, Mayor Winter, previous to his departure for Toronto tonight, summoned a meeting of the police commission, which issued an order that in future all collections made in the local court from any source are to be deposited in the vault in the treasurer's office each night. A complete revision of the system of bookkeeping that has been in vogue is also to be undertaken. Immediately following the disappearance of the money, Norman Warlow, assistant police court clerk, was dismissed, after making good the loss. No charge was preferred against him at that time, nor are any proceedings to be taken by Chief Wills, although no official statement has been made.
