### HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

A SUDDEN DEATH

W. W. Scott Collapses at His Work and Expires Soon After.

HAMILTON, April 15.—(Special)—While working at his bench in the Heron Tool Company's plant this afternoon, W. W. Scott was seen to suddenly collapse. He was hurried to the hospital, but expired just as he got there. He suffered an apoplectic stroke.

Princess Viroqua, sister of the late Dr. Oronhyatekha, who was to have addressed the members of the I. O. F. this evening, was stricken with paralysis in Oakville to-day.

Frid Bros., the firm of contractors who were handled so roughly by certain members of the city council last Monday night, have written an open letter to the mayor demanding a retraction from him for saying to the two men out of the council chamber that their work on the beach pumping house was "simply rotten and disgraceful." The mayor, replying, states he had no intention of injuring the firm.

City Treasurer Leckie reports that in twenty years the city has paid \$23,705 in insurance premiums and has received only \$4233 in rebates and settlements.

**Workmen Strike.**

About a dozen of the workmen employed by the city engineer's department have refused to continue working because the city engineer said they would have to shovel 30 feet of red clay a day. A dozen more were fired for kicking.

Arrangements are under way to build a burlesque house in Hamilton, probably on East King-street, at a cost of \$40,000.

The cast and chorus of Ermeline have declined to form a permanent operatic company, to produce one play a year.

St. Lawrence Power Transmission Co. Bill Gets Final Reading.

OTTAWA, April 15.—(Special)—The St. Lawrence Power Transmission Co. Bill was given its third reading to-night, after a division upon an amendment by Major Sharpe (North Ontario) that it be referred back to committee to insert a clause that nothing in the bill should revive any powers which may have lapsed under the St. Lawrence Power Co. Act of 1901.

Major Currie rose to move the six months' hold, but the Speaker ruled that the bill had been given a third reading. The bill has been amended almost beyond recognition.

### MILLER BILL IS PASSED IS BETTER THAN NOTHING

That's the Way the Promoter Looks at It—No Further Resolutions Intended Now.

OTTAWA, April 15.—(Special)—The Miller anti-race track gambling bill was given its third reading in the commons this evening after amendment on the lines of the compromise announced.

Mr. Miller said that in accepting the modified bill a good deal was being gained. He was afraid that if a compromise had not been accepted people would have thought that the advocates of the bill were more anxious to win a fight than to place good legislation on the statute books. The compromise would do away with handbook making, pool rooms and the dissemination of racing tips, and would reduce the length of meetings to seven days, allowing associations to hold not more than two such meetings within twelve months.

Many of those who had opposed the bill were actuated by a sincere desire to make racing clean, and this had been a consideration in inclining him to accept the compromise. He did not accept the compromise offered previously because he did not like it. Much had been gained by not accepting it. The length of meetings had been cut down by one day. Then a clause in the first proposed compromise which permitted betting between individuals was drafted in such a way that the bookmaker might have been exempted. The advocates of the bill did not yet concede that it is right to allow the business of betting.

Mr. Miller denied that another bill would be introduced next year for more restrictions. There should be a reasonable time allowed to see how the new bill would work out in practice. Another bill would be introduced only when public opinion demanded it, and that would to a large extent depend on how the racing associations conducted their tracks.

Seconded by Mr. McCall, he then moved amendments to the original bill. R. L. Borden enquired if the amendments had been approved by the minister of justice, and Mr. Pardee, chief Liberal whip, said that they had.

Major Currie asked if the clause would prevent newspapers in Canada and elsewhere from publishing betting odds. Even the London Times published betting odds and came into Canada and was sold by newsdealers.

Hon. Jacques Bureau, solicitor-general, said it was not his business to advise the house.

Geo. H. Cowan (Vancouver) thought some inducement ought to be held out to racing associations to limit the number of meetings. One meeting of ten days' duration once a year would be better than two meetings of seven days. David Henderson (Halton) favored the original bill.

Mr. Miller deprecated any further amendments. If the bill was not passed to-night it might not go thru the senate this session, and he was anxious that it should become law.
