ANGLO-FRENCH INCIDENT CLOSED

Premier Millerand Says Difficulty Was of a Passing Nature.

Paris, April 13.—In an interview Premier Millerand told the correspondent of Reuters that the Anglo-French incident of which had been exaggerated, now was definitely closed; that the difficulties which had been overshadowed the relations between Great Britain and France had been dissipated.

CHATHAM PLANT TO CLOSE

Chatham, Ont., April 13.—It was announced today owing to the United States switchmen's strike and the consequent inability to get raw material, the Dominion Sugar plant here will close tomorrow, throwing 350 men out of work.

100,000 UNEMPLOYED IN DETROIT

Detroit, Mich., April 13.—Railroad strikers here stood their ground today while company officials reiterated their determination not to deal with the "outlaw" union and looked to the railroad department for aid.

Albany Switchmen Strike

Albany, N.Y., April 13.—Nearly 200 switchmen and yard employees of the New York Central Railroad at the West Albany yards refused to go to work at eleven o'clock tonight, the hour for the night shift to begin work.

Chicago, April 13.—John Grunau, president of the Chicago Yardmen's Association, was still circulating today despite the decision reached after word was received from Washington that the railroad board had been appointed and would immediately take up the switchmen's demands.

More Out at Columbus

Columbus, Ohio, April 13.—Between 15 and 100 car repairers on the Big Four Railroad here went on strike tonight in sympathy with the switchmen.

Called Off Strike

Bay City, Mich., April 13.—Switchmen and yard tenders, numbering about 150, called off their strike here tonight. The decision was reached after word was received from Washington that the railroad board had been appointed and would immediately take up the switchmen's demands.

Spreading in Virginia

Wheeling, W. Va., April 13.—The strike of switching crews of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad spread to the Benwood yards tonight. Union officials announced that the yardmen at Benwood had walked out, and that operations at the terminal had been suspended.

Go Back to Work

Syracuse, N.Y., April 13.—Striking railroad men resumed work at the yards of the New York Central here today under a temporary settlement.

Returning at Utica

Utica, N.Y., April 13.—Fully half of the striking switchmen of the New York Central here returned to work this afternoon. The Delaware & Lackawanna strikers remain out.

Ontario Tax on Race Tracks Not to Affect Connaught Park

Ottawa, April 13.—The tax on race tracks, announced in the provincial legislature today, does not affect the Connaught Jockey Club, whose park is situated in the province of Quebec.

DANFORTH DEMANDS PAPE CAR ACTION

Blame Street Railway for Delay—Cromwell Needed in Canada.

Amusement and indignation was freely expressed at the meeting of the Danforth Ratepayers' Association, held in Franklin School, Logan avenue, last night, when Alderman Richard Honeywell stated that what the Pape avenue car line would not commence on April 15, as ordered by the Ontario Railway Board, owing to the Toronto Street Railway Company taking the matter to the court of law and being granted a stay of proceedings, owing to the Hydro-Electric poles on Pape avenue not being removed and the street not being repaved.

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Object to Discussion of Annexation With City

A meeting of the Danforth Park and Eastdale joint executive committee was recently held, when strong objection was taken to the action of the North York Ratepayers' Association in discussing the annexation of the eastern section of York township with the city. On the suggestion of Mrs. Rose, a resolution was passed to bring the matter before the members at tonight's meeting of the joint association in Second School, Barrington avenue, when the feeling of the meeting will be taken. It was further decided to grant permission to a Toronto annexation delegation to address the meeting.

SUSTAINS INJURIES TO HEAD

Mrs. Sewell, 335 Ontario street, sustained head injuries at 8:40 last night when she fell while alighting from a Carlton car at the corner of River and Gerrard streets. The ambulance conveyed the injured woman to the General Hospital.

HAMILTON \$1000 PER ROOM

Hamilton, Ont., April 13.—The Wentworth council at its meeting last afternoon opposed the location of a cemetery on the Toronto and Hamilton highway at the entrance of the city on what is known as the Carroll Point property. A resolution to this effect will be forwarded to Premier Drury, chairman of the private bills committee, and to the Hon. F. B. Higgins.

PLAYGROUNDS LACKING

Owing to the lack of sufficient playground facilities in the east end Rev. F. E. Powell, school trustee for ward 10, is advocating the throwing open of the district school playgrounds for the use of the children.

GARDEN PLOTS IN DEMAND

The Woodbine Heights garden plots committee have received a large number of applications for lots to date from members of the association. The five acres secured in the district bordering on Danforth avenue is convenient for the residents and also provides a foot path direct to the city cars on Danforth avenue. Fertilizer has been supplied free of charge to the plot holders by the Harris Company.

EARLS COURT DEBATES NAME FOR PARK

The name of Earls Court Park is again the subject of debate in this district, Ward Six North End Ratepayers' Association having decided that the name of Prince Edward is the best of any mentioned in the parks committee, at a recent meeting, was of the opinion that Earls Court was the name that was most popular in the neighborhood and that the people here would have no other. The S.I. has already been placed on record that they endorse the name of Earls Court for the park in response to a majority who have expressed themselves in favor. According to Ald. Sykes, no other name would be considered for the park than Earls Court, and he was instructed by the voters in Ward Six to support this contention in the parks committee at their last meeting at the city hall.

STRIKE RELIEF TIES UP BUSINESS; EVENING CLOSED

Banks and Exchanges Shut Down and Hotel Guests Forced to Cook Food.

Dublin, April 13.—The strike which began today in Ireland, except in Ulster, in sympathy with the political prisoners here and elsewhere, was a general one. At first it was intended as a one-day demonstration, but a manifesto issued today by the Trades Union Congress and the labor party calls for its continuance indefinitely.

The manifesto exhorts all citizens to assist in preserving perfect order. It says the strike is a solemn protest on which the lives of men are dependent, and that no occasion should be given the military for an outbreak of violence.

The strike could not have been more complete. All kinds of business were suspended. The banks and the stock exchange here, which managed to keep open during the anti-conscription strike, were compelled to close. Even the offices of the government department found it impossible to carry on their work.

Crowds of visitors who came to Dublin for the Panchestown races were marooned in hotels, where they were compelled to cook their own food and make their own beds. A few of the large hotels tried to keep open, but they were picketed and obliged to close their doors.

Up to a late hour this evening no disorders anywhere had been reported. Thousands of persons in Mount Joy were carrying on demonstrations outside the Mount Joy prison. Barbed wire entanglements had been erected there to prevent access to the prison. During the day airplanes sailed over the crowds, at times almost touching the house tops.

The Irish bishops at the eastern meeting at Mymouth today issued a statement commending the government's "insensate conduct."

Appealed to U. S. Consul. Acting Lord Mayor O'Neill of Dublin and High Sheriff McWalter appealed ineffectually today to John W. Davis, the American ambassador, after they had failed to persuade the American consul at Dublin to intervene for the Irish hunger strikers.

Ambassador Davis, in reply, telegraphed: "My powers do not extend to any representations except on behalf of citizens of the United States."

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Deaths Are Expected. Announcement of deaths among the hunger strikers have been expected by the people for the past twenty-four hours. As the time went by and the prisoners still survived, the most devout elements in the crowd of faith in the efficacy of their prayers.

Meanwhile, all the visitors who left the prison were urgently questioned regarding the condition of the hunger strikers.

Dublin is tied up more effectively by the present strike than in the memorable anti-conscription strike in 1915. Even the postoffice service, with the exception of the telegraph department, has a standstill, no letters being delivered. As the workers left the College Street postoffice early today, armed forces rushed in and took possession of the building.

Government Stands Firm. Will Resist Yielding on Question of Liberating Hunger Strikers.

London, April 13.—Indication that the government will firmly resist yielding on the question of liberating the Irish hunger strikers was the outcome of a debate started in the house of commons today by T. P. O'Connor, Nationalist, supported by John R. Clynes and other labor members.

Earlier in the session, Andrew Bonar Law, the government leader, admitted that many of the Irish prisoners, both at Mount Joy, Dublin, and in English institutions, are being detained without charges having been preferred against them and with no plans to bring them to trial going forward. Mr. Bonar Law was replying to questions and added that under existing conditions in Ireland, where murder was so rife, it was necessary for the protection of the public that persons be arrested on suspicion.

During the day's debate Mr. Clynes, pointing out the danger of the labor disturbances in Ireland, appealed to England, urged that the arrested men be either tried or subjected to special treatment. Sir Donald MacLean, Nationalist Liberal member, in supporting Mr. O'Connor, the Irish leader, complained that prisoners without trial are being treated as condemned criminals, and he advocated the appointment of a committee to investigate each case, as was done after the rebellion of 1916.

Dennis Henry, for the government, said that the question was not one of the party politics, but elementary civilization. The government, he said, was unable to bring the men to trial because any man suspected of having given evidence would later be found shot.

Ten thousand Irish constabulary are no longer able to maintain order without the aid of 1/2 military, he declared, pointing out that in the course of a single night recently there had been sufficient attacks on barracks in Ire-

SONORA REPUBLIC CALLED TO ORDER

Carranzist General Threatens Force Unless State Returns to Allegiance.

Nogales, Sonora, April 13.—General Dieguez, northern military commander for President Carranza, has issued an ultimatum to Governor De La Huerta and General Calles of the "Republic of Sonora," that military measures will be taken unless the state quickly returns to the national government, according to a report received here today.

General Carlos Plank, now first assistant to General Carranza, has issued a statement giving the plan of the new provisional government of Sonora.

General Plank is enroute to Agua Prieta to take charge of the forces of the new republic on the Chihuahua frontier. Advice received here from the south are to the effect that Governor Iturbide of Sinaloa remains loyal to the Carranza government and is tearing up railroad track on the border between the two states to hamper Sonora. Officials here maintain Sinaloa will support Sonora.

Several Carranza officers who had commanded federal troops in Sonora crossed to the United States last night and today after coming here from the interior. They were not molested by the Sonora officials.

El Paso, Texas, April 13.—Eight hundred federal troops arrived at Juarez, opposite here tonight on their way to Sonora, where an independent republic has been set up by Governor De la Huerta and other state officials.

MILITARY CLOSE TURKISH CHAMBER

Sultan's Order Provides for Elections Within Four Months.

Constantinople, April 13.—Turkish military officers today formally closed the chamber of deputies under an order from the sultan, which provides for the election of a new chamber within four months.

It is believed the sultan will issue a mandate authorizing the cabinet to ratify the allies' treaty.

The question of religious authority in Islam is raised by the ministry of religion in the sultan's government in Constantinople, and that of the Nationalist government at Ankara. The Sheik-ul-Islam at Constantinople has appealed to all Moslems, urging them to a holy war upon the Nationalists.

Replying to this, the Nationalist Sheik-ul-Islam has issued a religious decree, denouncing the sultan and discrediting the Constantinople appeal.

Unverified reports have reached Constantinople newspapers that the Ankara government has been transferred to Konia, 140 miles southwest of Ankara.

TO TRANSFORM TANGIER INTO SPANISH PROVINCE

Madrid, April 13.—The first of a series of meetings was held here Monday night to urge the transformation of Tangier into a Spanish province.

All the speakers claimed Spanish rights over Tangier, and declared that Tangier should be placed under the sovereignty of Spain or the Sultan of Morocco. The Strait of Gibraltar longer be a straight, they asserted, but a Spanish river.
