He said that there were more colonial aspirants nominated for the forthcoming elections than ever before, and considered this was in keeping with the imperialistic spirit of the day. The organization for an election there is very different from what it is in Canada. In Great Britain the candidates pay the expenses of the returning officers, deputies and poll clerks, so that no partisanship can be shown. Much of the election expenses is made up of hall rents and campaign literature. The halls are engaged long before the election here, and young men assemble to be addressed by party speakers. The newspapers are not the public educators there that they are here, and their place is largely taken by campaign literature, which is cleverly written and is distributed at these clubs at the expense of the candidates. The British workingman does not know as much about Canada as the Canadian does about Great Britain. The workingman there knows more about South Africa, Australia or Tibet. He follows the war.

The Northern Navigation Company will hold its annual meeting this morning. DROP IN FLOUR TRADE.

Shipments From Twin Cities Show Decline From 1903.

Minneapolis, Jan. 30.—Statistics which have been prepared by The Northwest Miller show why the millers of the Twin Cities have been alarmed during the last year over the flour situation. During 1904 the millers shipped almost continually decreasing the eastern receipts to reduce the rates on flour and to adjust the grain and flour rates as to the American millers. The tables presented show that during 1904 there were shipped a total of 11,300,000 barrels of flour from Minneapolis to the eastern ports of the city. This is a decrease of 2,100,000 barrels from the previous year, and of 2,680,000 from 1902.
