The domestic arrangements of the house are entirely under the care and superintendence of Mrs. Woodbridge; and a more kind, affectionate and painstaking lady could not hold such a position. Every pupil seems to be her especial care. Their food is all prepared by her own hands, their clothing is always clean and comfortable, their appearance neat, and all have the cheerful look of contentment on their little faces. As they mix with the family a stranger could not discern that any difference was made between them. At Christmas and other festival seasons, they have the same privileges as other and more wealthy children. Their Christmas tree is loaded with presents for all, and every enjoyment provided that can make them feel at home and happy.

In closing this report, I wish to say, briefly, that the moral, spiritual, intellectual and physical conditions of these unfortunate children are under the care of a Christian gentleman, who treats them as he would desire to have his own treated. The domestic department has all the care that a refined, intellectual and Christian lady can bestow.
