Coulon (Man), has been elected to play Miramichi in the Exhibition Rink on Thursday evening. The Campbellton team defeated the locale 6 to 2 in Campbellton but the Chatham team hopes to reverse the score here.

MANITOBA MURDER MYSTERY CLEARED UP

Winnipeg, March 24—The mysterious murder of a Galician, Alex. Ozanic, Saturday afternoon last, a few miles north of Coulon (Man), has been cleared up by arrest, by Chief Constable Baker, of Selkirk, of another Galician, who is now lodged in the provincial jail here, and has confessed that he slew Ozanic in cold blood because the latter had informed on him to the chief game warden for shooting moose out of season.
