Excitement in Chatham—Also Considerable Scarlet Fever in the Town.

Chatham, N. B., Oct. 13 (Special).—Ten thousand dollars have been paid into the local treasury since Saturday morning by delinquent taxpayers. This is a result of drastic measures undertaken by the finance committee to compel citizens to pay overdue taxes. Summonses were issued Saturday and since then money has flowed in the town's coffers as the rate of \$5.00 a day. Owners of real estate who have not paid up will have their property seized and sold. Scarlet fever is still prevalent and citizens expected that the school board at its regular session last evening would take up the question of closing the two schools for a time. Only two members showed up, and no meeting was held. One member said to-day that it was useless for them to close the schools while children are allowed to go out of quarantined houses and mingle with others.

## TONIGHT'S MEETING

Pugsley, Marcell, Logan and Pender at Opera House.

The Minister Will Reply to the Mayes Affidavit—Young Liberals Will Escort Speakers to The Opera House.

Tonight's big Liberal rally in the Opera House bids fair to be one of the greatest political demonstrations ever held in St. John. The speakers at the meeting will be Hon. Charles Marcell, deputy speaker of the House of Commons, Hance J. Logan, M.P., the brilliant young orator from Amherst, Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works and James Pender. The meeting will be called to order at 8 o'clock.

The Young Liberals Club will attend the meeting in a body, marching from their rooms, Gervais street, with bands and torches, to the Royal Hotel, to escort the speakers to the Opera House. They will meet at the rooms at 7:30 o'clock and every member is asked to be present.

The statement made by G. S. Mayes, which was read at the Conservative meeting last night, and which was expected to prove a bombshell in the Liberal camp, has proved to be a miserable fizzle. The lie was promptly given to the statement by Hon. Mr. Pugsley, who also tells of the efforts made by Mr. Mayes to blackmail him into paying an exorbitant price for his dredge by offering as a bribe a gift of \$20,000 for the campaign fund.

The trend of conversation on the streets today was that Mr. Mayes had been completely undone and that he had better have kept quiet as the statement can work injury on no one but himself.

On Thursday evening the Liberal workers of Wellington ward will be addressed by Percy E. Clark and John A. Barry. The meeting will be in the ward headquarters, LeLachur's Hall, Russell St.

The minister of public works and other speakers will address gatherings at Fairville on Thursday evening and Lorneville on Saturday evening.

## DESPONDENCY LED TO SUICIDE

Sad Tragedy in a St. John Home This Morning—Had Been Ill for Over a Year.

Miss Annie Knox, a daughter of James Knox, corner Sydney and Queen streets, committed suicide this morning by drinking carbolic acid. Miss Knox had been ill for more than a year and was rather despondent of late, so that a close watch had to be kept upon her. This morning she secured a bottle of carbolic acid and went into the bathroom and drank it. She was discovered there by her sister, and a hurried call was sent for a physician. Dr. Bentley responded, but was unable to do anything to save the young woman's life, and she passed away shortly afterwards.

Coroner Berman was also summoned and viewed the body. He is now making inquiries into the case.

Miss Knox was about 37 years of age. She leaves one sister, Miss Jean and two brothers, John, at present in the hospital where he is undergoing treatment, and Richard, as well as her father.

The coroner when seen said he did not consider an inquiry was necessary. The bottle of carbolic acid had not been purchased recently but had been in the house for some years. He thought the young woman must have swallowed about 3 or 4 ounces of the poison, and died almost immediately. Much sympathy will be extended to the bereaved family.

## THE SAD CASE OF HAROLD JOHNSTON

Yesterday afternoon between one and two o'clock Harold Johnston became suddenly despondent in his sister's home, 67 Spring street, and the cause of insanity is attributed to brooding over the elapsing Johnston, who is in the vicinity of twenty years old, has been employed as clerk in Macaulay Bros. establishment for several years. In the store for the past two weeks his confidant, a character had taken place in his demeanor. He was a very amiable youth, but of late he has grown morose and despondent and has been eager to take the initiative in a quarrel with his fellow employees.

He went home yesterday for the usual meal and immediately grew violent. Being unable to quiet him, his father, James J. Johnston, a carpenter, who had a strenuous half hour in manhandling the despondent young man. Afterward he was confined to a room and it is probable that he will be incarcerated in the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases.
