Stir in cornstarch while the rest is boiling. Beat whites of 6 eggs until stiff with 6 tablespoons confectionery sugar. Spread on top of pie when baked and return to oven, to brown.

HALIFAX MAN SAYS
PLENTY OF BUSINESS

Board of Trade Delegation To
Ottawa "Ill Advised"

(Halifax Evening Mail)

J. J. Penny, assistant manager of Wentzell's Limited, considers that the delegation which the Board of Trade sent to Ottawa to wait on the government regarding the landing of mulls at Halifax at the present time is ill advised.

"In the first place," Mr. Penny said, "there has not been a scheduled mail service during the last five or six months. The mails have been mostly going via New York and so far as Halifax is concerned we have more freight business here now than we can attend to. At the present time the C. P. R. is giving us two or three freight boats a week. The stevedores are not complaining, in fact they say they have all the work they can attend to. What Halifax and Canada want is freight boats, let the mails look after themselves until the war is over. Harry DeWolf, agent for the C. P. R., said that the C. P. R. is giving us more business than they have been for the last three or four years, in fact the prospects are that the C. P. R. will give us two or three steamers a week until the St. Lawrence opens in the spring. In fact there is more business offering with our present terminal facilities than Halifax and the I. C. R. can accommodate. One only has to go and take a walk through the terminal yards and see the congestion there and he will be well satisfied that Halifax is being well taken care of both by the government and the C. P. R. I am only voicing the sentiments of every sane business man in Halifax. This is no time to play the game of politics under the guise of Halifax first."

REV. DR. MORISON ON
THE NEED OF ECONOMY

The need of economy on the part of all the people, as one of the very important elements of victory in the war was strongly urged by Rev. Dr. Morison in a powerful sermon delivered in Cathedral Presbyterian church last evening. The war has settled down to a war of resources, and Mr. Lloyd George had pointed out that "the silver bullet" would ultimately tell. Napoleon had said that the first thing in war was gold, and the second more gold, and the third most gold. The northern states won the Civil War because they were out and utterly exhausted the south. It will be so in the war with Germany. When calamity overtakes a family it must economize. It is so with the nation, which is but a larger family. The solvency of the nation must be preserved by the continued ability of the people to provide the government with the money required. That is why the people of Britain and of Canada are urged to save their money. But for such saving in Canada the government could not have floated that \$100,000,000 loan. In conclusion Dr. Morison said:—"Since this war began I have preached recruiting sermons in this church until nearly all of our available young men have gone to the fighting lines. We have even now compelled to get an additional oak tablet for the vestibule of this church to record the names of those who have more recently enlisted."

"Tonight I do not appeal for more men. I do most earnestly appeal to you all to help our cause by beginning with out delay to practice economy. Do not misunderstand me. It would be penny wise and pound foolish to become so niggardly in parting with your money that trade, ordinary and legitimate trade would be disturbed. What I mean is that you ought to cut out all unnecessary and frivolous spending. You ought so far as is reasonably possible endeavor to so discriminate in your buying as that there may be the largest possible demand for home products and a corresponding diminution of the demand for imported goods."

AMERICAN LEADER
OF BOY SCOUTS QUILTS

New York, Dec. 5.—Ernest Thompson Seton, naturalist and writer of books on nature, today announced his resignation as chief scout of the Boy Scouts of America. In a statement, explaining his action, Mr. Seton said he resigned because of a gradual change towards policies to which he is opposed.

"Militarism now comes first and woodcraft, the original purpose of the movement, second," according to Mr. Seton, who announced the formation of the Woodcraft League, inviting members of the Boy Scouts to join it.

"When Baden Powell and I organized the Boy Scouts of England in 1908 and the Boy Scouts of America in 1910," Mr. Seton's statement said, "our purpose was to make all young people of America outdoor children by teaching them the joys of outdoor life."

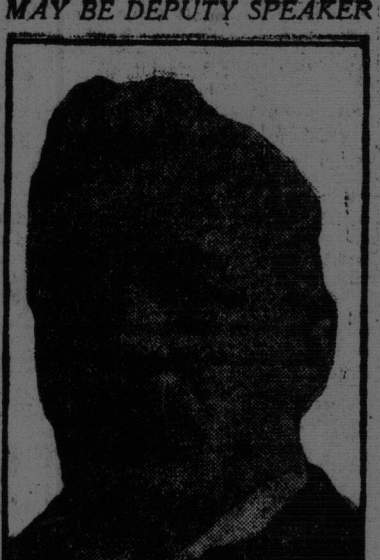
