PREMIERS ASK BETTER CONTROL OF STOCK SALES

Provincial Leaders Decide to Ask For Federal Bill

COAL MATTERS UP

Conference at Ottawa Decides in Favor of Large Coking Plants

Ottawa, Ont., June 9.—The conference of provincial governments decided at their session here last night to ask the Dominion government to pass a bill which would enable the several provinces to more fully control the sale of stocks and shares within their borders.

They also went on record as favoring government steps to ensure the erection of coking plants in the large centres in order to provide fuel for the people of Canada from the coal mines of the Dominion instead of importing it.

COAL COMPETITION

The resolution in this connection also went on record as favoring such other government assistance as might be necessary to supply Canadian coal to Central Canada at prices that would compete with the imported fuel. The question will be further elaborated upon when the premiers appear before the fuel committee of the House of Commons today.

The provincial ministers had expected to conclude their sessions last night, but after sitting until nearly midnight, decided to convene again today.

In connection with the sale of shares a draft bill which met the approval of the conference, will be submitted to the Dominion government.

KILLS BEAR AFTER FIGHT IN FOREST

Idaho Woodman, Severely Wounded, Found Beside Dead Grizzly

BOISE, Idaho, June 9.—His body torn and bruised, Jim McCann, woodsman, was slowly recovering today from the effects of a battle with a large grizzly bear, in which he emerged the victor. McCann met bruia in his own haunts, the desolate mountain wilderness near the Salmon River, and tamed of possible death with a hunter's knife after the bear attacked him. In the fight that ensued McCann's right arm was almost torn from its socket and his scalp severely bruised.

After the battle, McCann, fearing he would die, scribbled a note to his brother, William, saying, "Bill the bear killed me, but I killed him." The woodsman's rifle had been knocked from his grip when the grizzly came up from the rear and fell upon him. A trail of blood separated the victor and the vanquished when friends came upon them several hours later.

BIG BEAR CAUGHT IN MADAWASKA CO.

Three Hundred Pound Brute Struggles Desperately But Loses Life

ST. LEONARDS, June 9.—Leonard Violette and William Bird of St. Leonard, have returned from the woods, 35 miles from here with a big black bear which had been caught in one of their traps. The animal has a very fine fur and weighs approximately 300 pounds. Superhuman efforts had been made by the bear to free himself from the trap. He even dragged a dead weight of several hundred pounds to which the trap had been chained in an effort to gain his freedom. Almost all of his teeth were broken in his efforts to bite and break the iron trap. When he was discovered by the trappers he advanced a few steps but made no effort to hurt his captors. He was put out of his misery and brought to St. Leonard where he was on exhibition.

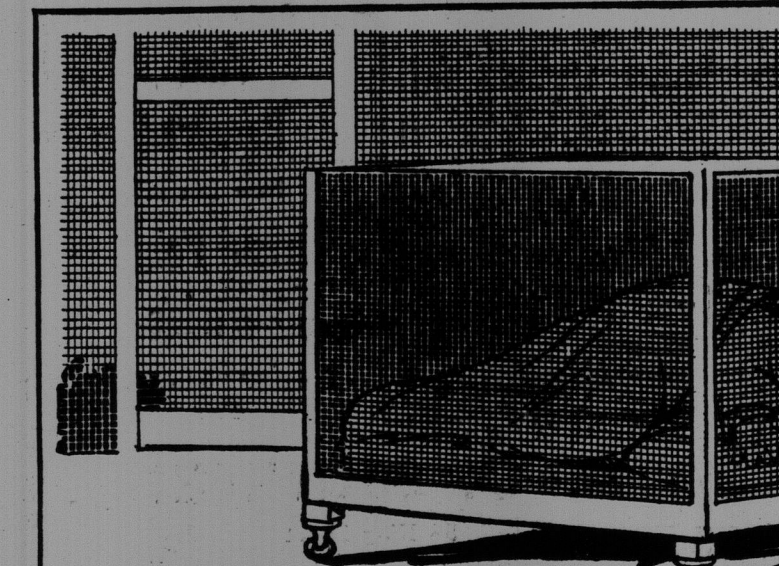
Catholic Churches In Mexico Ordered Shut

CONFIDENCE IN LLOYD GEORGE VOTED, 20 TO 12

Group Now Is Definitely Split Into Two Sections

LONDON, June 9.—David Lloyd George came victorious out of the conflict with the Earl of Oxford and Asquith yesterday in the meeting of the Liberal parliamentary party, where he was sustained as Liberal leader in the House of Commons, by a vote of 20 to 12.

Thirty-four members of the party were present at the meeting. This means that Mr. Lloyd George will retain his chairmanship, but that the small Liberal party, of a total membership of about 40, is definitely split into two sections, which will follow the leadership of Lloyd George and Lord Oxford respectively.

It further indicates that Lord Oxford rejected the advice of numerous members of the party belonging to both sections, that he endeavor to seek a reconciliation of the differences, these

PROBE BOAT SEIZURE

British Legation Asks Particulars of Capture Off California Coast

MEXICO CITY, June 9.—It was learned today that the British legation has sent a note to the Foreign Office, requesting information regarding the capture of an alleged Canadian run running boat off the coast of Lower California. It is said that the Mexican Government will reply that the liquor smuggling treaty between Mexico and the United States requires Mexico to assist the United States authorities in preventing run running.

BRIAND REASSURED

Cabinet, at Meeting, Today Stands United, Despite Rumors of Breaks

PARIS, June 9.—The ninth government of Aristide Briand stands united, at least for the present. The tension caused by the thousand and one rumors of changes or resignations in the ministry appears to have been lightened after a meeting of the cabinet this morning, preparatory to a session of the cabinet council presided over by President Doumergue.

CONCILIATION FAILS

There was much talk about the possibility of invoking Lord Reading as conciliator or possibly the new leader of the party, but apparently this plan has fallen through. Mr. Lloyd George presided at yesterday's meeting and Sir John Simon, one of the committee of three appointed at the previous meeting, gave details of his conference with Lord Oxford when he acquainted him with the "sense of the meeting," as previously instructed. Sir John also read a letter to Sir Godfrey Collins from Lord Oxford, who declared that he was acting after full reflection and with complete absence of personal or sectional feeling, and he decided that "nothing has happened since my letter to you last week, to alter the view I then felt bound to express."

In this letter Lord Oxford virtually read Lloyd George out of the party, declaring that the parliamentary chairman's action in failing to join the party council was equivalent to his resignation.

The meeting then discussed the resolution moved last week by Sir Robert Thomas—that the Liberal party in the House of Commons deprecates the publicity given to the differences between the Liberal leaders and expresses the earnest hope that "our leaders will use their best endeavors to restore unity in the ranks."

SOME PLAIN SPEAKING

Mr. Lloyd George had urged that the proceedings should be private but his view was overruled by Sir Godfrey Collins, who insisted that the Liberals outside the parliamentary party, were not to know what had occurred at the meeting. The outcome was not in the nature of a surprise, the only real curiosity beforehand being to learn whether Lord Oxford had yielded to the advice to patch up the quarrel.

Plain speaking was indulged in at the meeting, but the result was a foregone conclusion if the matter was pushed to a vote. It is argued that the next move lies with the 12 members of the party, who voted against Lloyd George, Sir John Simon is considered the head of this section, the members of which are asserting that Mr. Lloyd George's chief supporters are of Tory persuasion and hold their seats in the House of Commons mainly by the support of Tory votes.

DISCUSS HOME FOR FEEBLE-MINDED

Social Service Council Executive Committee is Appointed at Meeting Here

The need of a home for the feeble-minded of the province was the subject of a meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon, of the Saint John section of the Social Service Council of New Brunswick. Rev. H. A. Goodwin, the chairman, spoke of cases that had come to his attention and advocated an institution where such people might be cared for. Dr. Mabel Hanington proposed that a committee, the function of which would be to receive subscriptions for this work, be named.

After discussion the following resolution was adopted: "That looking towards the time when institutional provision for the care of the feeble-minded may become possible in New Brunswick a committee be formed to receive funds for the purpose, and to further in any way feasible this urgent project."

The committee named, with power to add, was composed of as follows: Rev. H. A. Goodwin, Rev. J. W. Bevis, and Dr. Mabel Hanington as secretary-treasurer.
