

TO ORGANIZE BANK CLERKS OF NEW YORK

A. F. of L. Backs Union
Drawing From Field
of 20,000 Men.

TO IGNORE RAISES
Salary Scale Revision Claim-
ed Insufficient Remedy
for Conditions.

New York, July 28.—The unionization of 20,000 clerks and other bank employees in New York is being pushed, with the support of the American Federation of Labor, by Bookkeepers, Stenographers and Accountants' Union, No. 12948, according to an announcement made by its secretary, Ernest Bohm.

The union, in the statement of Bohm, claimed credit for the movement recently launched by financial institutions to abandon in the fall the bonus system for a general upward revision of wages.

Bohm's statement said that it was not until after the union of the bank employees had been started that bank officials announced their intention of granting wage increases.

"Five and ten dollar increases will not defeat our purpose to organize bank employees," he added.

The statement explained that the work of organizing is "proceeding quietly" since employees report they are in fear of being discharged if they disclose their membership in the union.

"Our union," said Bohm, "has taken advantage of the fact that two labor banks have been started in this city. The employees of the Amalgamated Bank and the Federation Bank have

MANY SCENIC BEAUTIES HERE

A Drive to Lorneville on a
Bright Afternoon Shows
Much to Charm.

A drive to Lorneville on a bright afternoon is an occasion that is fraught with glorious possibilities of view and pretty little incidents. The highway of gravel is slowly becoming a good firm road. Variety of scenery is the great charm of this route, with the broad sea at the left and richly wooded land to the right as one passes from the city along Manawagonish Road. Here a fresh breeze fans one's cheeks and long stretches of green fields and marshlands separate the motorist from the ocean, which sends its salt air far inland. Pine gardens are seen at every turn and comfortable farm houses stand out to greet the passer-by or are hidden by greenery and large trees. Not long since, in driving over this route on a very hot day, the advantages of being near the sea were never more appreciated. After driving through Lorneville, viewing the quaint church, which stands for good Presbyterian worshippers, who are staunchly loyal to their faith, and feeling, in the shelter of the high rock on which the church stands, the extreme heat, a sudden turn in the road brought a cool wind from the sea, which was near at hand, and quickly one had recourse to a wrap, so rapid was the change in temperature—a welcome change.

The warm sun was unusual for St. John and young and old were abroad to get what comfort could be derived from such an occasion. A baby, just able to sit alone, was enjoying herself on a large rug spread on the grass, her close companions, whom she enjoyed with coos and baby laughter, were two pretty hens and some half-grown chickens. Not far away, a wee girl, about five years old, had taken compassion on a young calf, just three weeks old, and the tiny girl was teaching the small calf to drink, by thrusting her hand into a can of water and letting the animal suck it up in that way.

In a field, thick with daisies, beautiful to see but the bane of the farmer, was picking strawberries, and her dish was full of the luscious fruit, which seemed to be plentiful and just awaiting ready hand. Some of the city folk driving along were enthusiastic over the daisy covered fields and the fruit, and were quite disappointed to know that the appearance of these delights showed lack of cultivation on the part of the farmer, and pressed aim far for the animals next winter. The nets were hung in scores to dry in the hot sun and boys and girls were wading in the shallow pool, which a few hours hence would be a rushing stream, when the tide had reached its height. Then the nets would be set and a large catch of salmon be the toll paid by the sea.

The return trip from Lorneville, is quite another picture, for now the sea is at the right, and one seems to be ever climbing hills to get another view of the bay and peeps of the St. John River, with here and there a sight of the city or evidences of it in the curling smoke and far-off chimneys. There comes to view at every turn, and there are many, some new beauty of tree and water, with here and there the steeple of a church and all around and ever recurring, is the sweet smell of cedar, of fir and fern, with wild roses blending in wondrous perfume. Occasionally one passes under a fine avenue of trees that shade from sun and wind and the car seems to glide slowly, involuntarily, loath to leave a lover so restful.

A lady who has traveled in many countries, where mountains and sea are the great attraction, is constantly asking to be taken on this road and always affirms that it is as full of interesting beauty and rugged scenery combined as any she has seen in other lands. The eye may feast itself and never tire, while the brain is rested with the greenery and the peaceful aspect of landscape and cool breezes. There is comfort in the surety of provision for the coming winter yielded by the sea and the full of promise at this season.
