CAPTAIN SWIFT.

Earle Williams Demonstrates Versatility in Role That Shows Him as Both Gentleman and Showman in Master Touch.
Earl Williams, who has long been associated with drawing-room roles, proves the assertion that he is equally as well equipped to handle the character of an Australian bushman in "Captain Swift," which was shown at the Unique Theatre yesterday. He delineates both the drawing-room lover and the wild, unshaven male who preys upon the thrifty. Each characterization is drawn with the master touch that has long made Earl Williams a favorite of the screen. It is difficult to decide which role is handled the better.
"Captain Swift" is a picture of the famous stage play and is superior to the stage version. The life of Captain Swift in Australia was not shown in the play; therefore much of the beauty of the story was lost. The scene in the desert at the time Captain Swift is eluding a posse are intensely dramatic. They also develop the character of the highwayman and win sympathy for this man, who by force of circumstances was driven into the ways of an outlaw.
Cut backs are used effectively and give the players ample opportunity to show their versatility. This was impossible in the stage version and was handled by means of dialogue. A change in the ending has improved the film version and made it far more pleasing than the play. Those who remember the stage version will recall that Captain Swift committed suicide in the last act. It is not so with the film version. He works

BEES' RIGHTS UPHELD.

Court Decides They May Roam at Will, Sting at Pleasure.
Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 6.—A bee has a right to roam at will, Judge Nelson Johnson has ruled in the Circuit Court here. Judge Johnson was hearing an appeal in the case of Lee Cooley, fined \$50 in police court some time ago on the ground that he "harbored vicious bees."
The complaining witness at that time asserted that one of Cooley's bees had stung a child five times, and Judge Johnson, after listening to the testimony of bee experts, announced he was convinced that a bee could sting but once, and he held a city ordinance restricting the wanderings of bees was unconstitutional and ordered that Cooley's fine be refunded.
The National Apiary Association had made a test case of the affair.

225 TONS OF SLEET TO ACQUIRE

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 6.—Professor Charles P. Brooks of the meteorological department of Clark University made public data regarding the recent sleet storm. The precipitation of rain and sleet was 3.77 inches during the three days, he said, representing a weight of 225 tons an acre on the ground.
One pine tree which he measured carried a weight of five tons of ice on one side. A single blade of grass fifteen inches long covered with ice weighed a pound and six ounces. He also figured that every 100 feet of telegraph and telephone wire weighed eighty-seven pounds with its one and two-thirds inches coating of ice.
These figures were considered of interest because of the miles of wire and the thousands of trees and poles that went down under the ice burden.
