MILLION DOLLAR FIRE IN CHICAGO

Chicago, June 29—Fire believed to have started by sparks from a passing train destroyed a Chicago, Burlington and Quincy freight house, three loading platforms and seventy-five freight cars on adjacent tracks last night at Cicero, a suburb, with an estimated loss of \$1,000,000.

The freight house and freight cars were filled with merchandise and food-stuffs, including thousands of pounds of flour and sugar.

FOR THE HARVEST

Winnipeg, June 29—Fifty thousand farm laborers will be required to harvest the 1920 crop of the prairie provinces, so it was estimated yesterday by J. A. Bowman, provincial commissioner of colonization. He said that bumper crops in all three provinces warranted the increase, which is one third greater than the number of men engaged in farm work last year.

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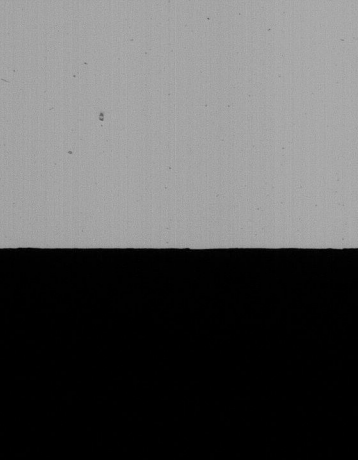
