Sets New World's Record.

Wichita, Kas., Aug. 21.—Joseph Wilhoit, outfielder of the local Western League Club, and who will go to the Boston Americans next month, yesterday ended his batting streak in which he set a new world's record by hitting safely in sixty-nine consecutive games. The former record of forty-five consecutive games was made by James, Oakland, Calif., in 1915. Wilhoit, who formerly played with the Boston Nationals and the New York Giants, in the sixty-nine contests prior to today, was at bat 209 times and secured 191 hits. His percentage was .605. He obtained five home runs, eight triples, twenty-three doubles and 115 singles.

Regarding Baseballs.

The Toronto Times in an article says: "Baseball promises to be like golf next season in that the loss of a ball will hold up the game. There will be no more nonchalant throwing in of another according to sporting goods dealers, the best quality of league ball now retailing at \$1.25, is going to be \$2.50 next year, exactly double what they are now. They admit that the quality will not be any better, if indeed it is as good, as the present crop."

The question which St. John fans will be endeavoring to answer is: If a regulation ball costs \$1.25 in Toronto this year and \$2 in St. John, how much will a ball costing \$2.50 in Toronto next year be worth in St. John? Regarding the quality of the balls this year they cannot compare with the ball which retailed in St. John a few years ago. The majority are different in weight and some are not round. In a recent game here three new balls were taken from their boxes and none agreed in weight. One of the three approached oblong in shape.

WONDERFUL WING POWER OF SOME BUTTERFLIES
The most wonderful of ocean-fliers are the butterflies which cross the ocean in the spring. Naturalists tell us that one of the most amazing sights in the world is the sight of these delicate creatures, like a cloud of tiny pieces of paper, flying across the Channel, from the Continent to English shores when the wind is favorable. Their stamina and endurance are extraordinary, and although some fall exhausted into the sea, they make a successful crossing. The butterfly army of invasion generally includes many beautiful specimens, and as an illustration of their powers of endurance, it might be mentioned many butterflies have descended to rest on vessels 200 miles at sea. The farthest authenticated distance at which a moth has been captured at sea was recorded by a well-known scientist eighty years ago, who took specimens of a certain large moth 1,200 miles from the nearest possible land.—Tit Bits.

ENGLISH HOUSES.
An Englishman's house has been considered his castle, but it is beginning to dawn upon him that it has had few of the modern comforts of a home. The Daily Mail is now offering 2,500 prizes to architects and the public for plans and suggestions to revolutionize the interiors of antiquely planned homes. Thus the much-maligned household efficiency devices and arrangements are at last taking hold. One of the chief reasons is the dearth of servants and the churlishness of the available supply. The average English house was originally so built as to necessitate the employment of the greatest number of servants in the smallest of houses. Even that scorned habit of steam heat is making headway, principally through economic necessities as well as the untidiness of servants to carrying coal to the top floors. The Daily Mail says that 80 per cent. of the fuel used is wasted. In recent efficiency tests it was proved that in an house a maid servant walked a total of nearly a mile to make and serve a pot of tea. When Charles M. Schwab was returning from France he was on a boat carrying many negro soldiers and learned that many of them were without money. Mr. Schwab loaned \$1 each to 154 of the negro soldiers and told them they need not pay it back unless they wanted to. He supposed very few of them would return the loan and is agreeably surprised because 158 of the 154 soldiers have sent him a dollar each.

For the same department a secretary is also sought. This position carries a salary of \$2,700 per annum. The department of trade and commerce requires a price statistician for which position the salary is \$1,800 per annum. These and other vacancies are listed in the current issue of the Canada Gazette.

HIGH TENDERS FOR NURSES' NEW HOME.
The lowest tender received for the erection of a nurses' home at the General Public Hospital is \$32,000 more than the amount voted for that purpose by the municipal council. On the original specifications, the lowest tender received was \$148,000 and as only \$105,000 was voted, the specifications were revised and a new call for tenders made. The lowest complete tender received at the second call was for \$151,000 and this with engineer's and architect's fees will make the total cost about \$157,000. The matter is to be referred to the council.
CIVIC RECEPTION FOR CURRIE AT TORONTO
