(1) To ring the ebll of the called station at least three times during a period of 60 seconds. (2) To verify the number a second time, if there is doubt

(3) To change the trunk line and ring the station again, in the case of a call made to another central office.

"Don't Answer" Reports Are Given by the Operators When the Above Routine Has Been Completed, and (1) There is no one near enough to the called station to

hear the bell when it is rung, or (2) There is an unusual delay in answering at the called station or

(3) Through an error by the subscriber in giving, or the operator in repeating, an incorrect number is given and a wrong station is called, and no one answers, or (4) There is mechanical trouble which has not yet come to

the attention of the Maintenance Department. A prompt answer at the called station will reduce the number of "Don't Answer" reports. In a busy central office the operator handles many calls nd despatch. If a call goes wrong, she does her

best to right it. Occasionally a tangle comes, however, which deserves the services of a specialist. Behind the operator stands the supervisor. She is ready to give your call her personal attention, check it up from start to finish, and right it, whenever the probabilities, as you know them, warrant you in asking for this special service.

R. J. Armstrong Converts Queen's

Rink Into Home of Motion Pic-

Robert J. Armstrong, who has been identified with local theatres and sporting establishments for more than a score of years, has entered the motion picture field and in the near future will open a new theatre opposite Queen Square. Mr. Armstrong, who owned the Queen's rink, has converted it into a picture house, so the south end can now boast a theatre, which can compare favorably with any of its size in the province. It will be known as the Queen Square Theatre. The new front on the building is of unique and pretty design and when illuminated should prove a source of attraction to passers by. On entering, a spacious lobby greets the visitor. This will accommodate more than 200 people. In the centre is the ticket office, and on the ends are two lavatories. The theatre will accommodate more than 1,000 people, with the screen visible from any angle. It is built in the shape of a saucer and is conveniently graded. The seats are plush covered and comfortable. The stage is only a few feet above the level of the street and those in the front rows can watch the pictures without being uncomfortable. The interior of the theatre is covered with steel and artistically decorated. The lighting system is modern and the building well ventilated, and heated by steam. On either side are two large exits.
