## ALLEGED SWINDLE SCHEME

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 18 - With the arrests today in this city of one alleged by the government to constitute a monumental swindle-quick chain of swindlers, United States Marshal James J. Connelley, who have brought to the surface an organization that has swindled small corporations, agents and promoters of \$1,000,000 in the last three years.  
The arrests were made as the result of secret information received here by the United States grand jury. Those arrested were: F. D. Mynard, at Cleveland; O. H. Connelley, at St. Paul, Minn.; H. W. Warden, Rochester (N. Y.); Mason G. Worts, New York; Thomas E. Harkley, New York; and Bruce Crane, of Newark (N. J.).  
The plan of operations, it is charged in the indictment, was for members of the concern to advertise their ability to sell stocks for promoters and investors. Those who answered the advertisement were told that the stock could not be sold at its true value unless guaranteed by a reliable guaranty company. The customer was then recommended, it is charged, to George Hannaford, who conducted the Chicago Adventure Company. Hannaford, the indictment states, would guarantee the stock, charging one per cent. of the value. The promoter then would be informed that a purchase for the entire issue had been arranged, and the promoter would be found worthy. A charge rating as high as one-third, or sometimes forty-five per cent. of the value, would be made for this investigation. Afterwards the promoter was informed that his proposition had proved to be no good, and was dropped.

## "BATHTUB TRUST"

### DEALT A DEATH BLOW

#### U. S. Supreme Court Holds That Combinations Under Cloak of Patent Laws are Illegal.

Washington, Nov. 18 - The supreme court of the United States today delivered a death blow to violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust law, under the cloak of the protection of the patent laws, by annulling as invalid "license agreements" which held manufacturers of sanitary ironware together in the combination known as the "Bath Tub Trust."  
Justice McKenna delivered the unanimous opinion of the court. He said that rights conferred by patents were extensive, but did not give a universal license to the positive prohibitions of the Sherman law. The decision fully sustained the government in its fight begun over a year ago against the Bath Tub and Kalamazoo Valve Trusts.

## SHAKE-UP ON BANGOR AND ARROOSTOOK ROAD

### Office of General Superintendent Abolished, Others Combined and New One Created

The board of directors of the Bangor and Arroostook railroad at a meeting in Bangor last week elected:  
F. W. Todd, vice-president and the office of general superintendent was abolished. W. M. Brown, who has held the latter position for some years, was offered another place in the company's service but declined to retire, and the directors voted him three months' salary.  
Mr. Brown has been connected with the Bangor and Arroostook R. R. for a great many years, and before that was with the old Bangor & Pictou Railroad.  
The directors voted to combine the road done by the car record and car distributing offices under one head with the title of superintendent of car service, and J. H. Orr, who has been employed by the company for many years, was appointed to that position.

## GETTING BACK AT UNCLE SAM

### Russian Project to Reclaim Great Area for Cotton Cultivation

Odessa, Nov. 18 - At a cost of \$5,000,000 an area of 500,000 acres on the Golden Plains in Turkestan is being irrigated and reclaimed for cotton cultivation by the crown. This work is the initial result of a scheme elaborated by M. Krivosheina, minister of agriculture and imperial domain, for promoting cotton culture in Central Asia to a sufficient extent to enable Russia to dispose with foreign cotton imports.  
The Caucasian and Transcaspian plantations already produce 50 per cent of Russia's cotton supply, the rest being imported from the United States and Egypt. To start the scheme of M. Krivosheina, who lately made a five weeks' touring inspection of the vast cotton lands in Turkestan, Agents of 200,000,000 rubles is necessary, and the imperial exchequer is now at present in a position to grant so large a special credit. The primary incentive to this ministerial project is the Washington government's abrogation of the Russo-American commercial treaty of 1855.

## TO TAX VISITORS

### Fifty French Mayors May Be Blocked in Project By Popular Opinion

Paris, Nov. 18 - Fifty mayors of seaside places on the Atlantic coast of France, including Sables d'Olonne, Biarritz, Amion, Royan, and other popular resorts, met at the town hall of La Rochelle and passed unanimously a motion in favor of taxing all visitors.  
The tax will be imposed in the same way as the "tour-tax" in many towns in Germany. On arrival every visitor will be asked to sign a declaration as to the probable length of his stay, and will be charged a sum, for which he will be handed in his hotel bill.  
The Paris newspapers are raising an outcry against the proposed impost, which they criticize as a tax on fresh air and sea water. It is not improbable that the scheme will fall through.
