Boston, June 14.—Mrs. Lillian Baldwin Burdman, niece of Mrs. Nordica and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Baldwin of Frederick, has filed an action for divorce in the New York supreme court against Frederick K. Burdman. An application has been made to Justice Cohn for alimony and counsel fees.

Mrs. Burdman, who was well known in the younger social set in Frederick, Mass., was married to Mr. Burdman, the son of Frederick Burdman, former president of the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association, and lived at 98 East Street, eighth street, New York. Mrs. Burdman has named more than one woman in her charges, which are generally denied by her husband.

DEATH OF HUGH RYAN

Many residents of this city will be shocked to hear of the death of Hugh Ryan, which occurred this morning at his home in Brussels street. Mr. Ryan, who was very well known in this city, had been ill for several months, but had not been confined to his bed until yesterday. Early yesterday morning he took a bad turn and he never rallied. He was born at Loch Lomond, and was in the sixty-third year of his age. For more than thirty years he conducted a grocery store in Brussels street, and was of the most highly respected of that section. He continued in business up till two years ago, when he was forced to retire on account of ill-health. He was a member of the Universal Chimney Cleaning Co. of this city, and Miss Margaret and Julia of Boston. One brother, Patrick Ryan, died a few years ago. Sister Mary, Superiora of the Sacred Heart Convent in Montreal is a niece. The funeral arrangements have not been completed yet.

SEAMEN'S STRIKE SPREADS

LONDON, June 19.—The strike of seamen is spreading among the crews of the north coasting trade on the Clyde and the Tyne is threatened with at least a temporary stoppage. Clerks in the office of the ship-owners make poor substitutes for the burly dockside laborers. The stewards of the White Star Line, Messageries Maritimes, and the Allan Line, are all at Liverpool and quit today.

fair as the amounts apportioned to districts of the same size differed by \$30 or \$70. The basis of assessing is an historical one and is set by previous amounts.

The amounts raised by districts is as follows: St. John, \$41.20; Fredericton, \$275.30; Woodstock, \$182; Chatham, \$141.45; Sackville, \$246; St. Stephen, \$128.25; Charlottetown, \$289; Summerside, \$227.

In the report for the superannuated fund the receipts totalled \$2,020.71. The assessment for next year by districts is as follows: St. John, \$700; Fredericton, \$457; Woodstock, \$250; Chatham, \$226; Sackville, \$353; St. Stephen, \$205; Charlottetown, \$448; Summerside, \$355. The total estimate for the coming year is \$3,344.

The report of the special committee to consider the report of Rev. Geo. Steele, the agent for the increase of the superannuated fund by endowment was favorably received. Rev. Dr. Steele was heard by the conference, and the whole amount of the endowment fund was \$1,000. The Mr. Allison forward movement had made his work more energetic. Promises for Mount Allison were \$1,000. The Newfoundland conference contributed \$2,000 and Nova Scotia \$3,800 for the support of the fund. With this assistance sixty per cent. of the claims had been paid.

COURT CUTS THE BILL DOWN TO \$95

Brett, M. R. says in re Garnett, 81 Ch. Div. p. 9. "The law is that when an attempt is made to charge a dead person in a matter in which if he were alive he might have answered the charge, the evidence ought to be looked at with great care; the evidence ought to be thoroughly sifted, and the mind of any judge who hears it ought to be first of all, in a state of suspicion; but if in the end the truthfulness of the witnesses is made perfectly clear and apparent, and the tribunal which has to act on their evidence believes them, the suggested doctrine becomes absurd"—that is, the doctrine that uncorroborated evidence of a claimant against the estate of a deceased man will be rejected.

Judge Awards \$85

I think from the fact that the deceased disposed of more of his estate in specific bequests than his estate would warrant if this claim were to be paid is evidence that he did not expect to die. The presumption probably is that he thought the \$800 legacy to the claimant's wife was a sufficient recognition of what he had received. He gave her, a niece by marriage, a sum equal to what he specifically gave to two of his children and greater than that which he specifically gave to his other son and to his three daughters. It is true they were to receive their share in the residuary estate, but this could not amount to very much among them all. To his other nieces he gave much smaller sums, in several cases only \$50 each.

Then we must scrutinize carefully the conduct of the claimant in regard to the claim. Why did he not ask the deceased for some money during all this period of time? Why did he not ask for it until he was asked to do so? Did he not by not asking for payment to be handed over to him, in the residuary estate, and to his wife, why did he not mention the claim in writing for \$10 and remain silent about his large claim? Why did he not mention the claim to the executors when the will was read? Why did he afterwards write, reported in favor of the testatrix? The order of the day for the afternoon is the reception of the station sheet and the report of the tenor of the station sheet. This evening Rev. J. L. Batty will speak on temperance and moral reform.
