ST. SOPHIA'S TEMPLE DOME IN DANGER

Masterpiece Which Has Lived Through Centuries Now Seething to Ruin For Lack of Repair. Constantinople, Aug. 5.—The magnificent dome of the world-famed Byzantine fane of St. Sophia ("Divine Wisdom"), an incomparable architectural marvel of ages past, is beginning to yield to the heavy weight of its sixteen centuries of existence. Time, humidity, earthquakes, conflagrations, bombardments, have each and all, contributed their share of damage, undermining slowly but surely, the strength and solidity of a proud memorial of Hellenic inspiration and achievement.

It is not likely that the dome will ever be restored to its full original beauty and magnificence, as only the designer, Anthemius of Tralles, who died in the sixth century, knew the mysterious problems and the secrets of its marvellous construction. Already the casual observer perceives that the external aspect of the cupola presents no more a smooth, harmonious construction. The eastern part of it defects downwards. This is the part that has suffered most from the course of ages. In 1094 it was destroyed by an earthquake, together with the apse and the ambon. What it was rebuilt, the whole dome was raised several feet higher than its original elevation, a performance which was regarded as a wonderful architectural feat.

The Emperor John VI Palaeologus in the 14th century did much to preserve the temple. In more recent times (1847) the enlightened Sultan Abdul Medjid undertook the reparation of the damage done by time and earthquake. His employes the Italian architect Fossati, who performed it, on the whole, exceedingly well. Through his thorough restorations the temple of St. Sophia was able to withstand the assaults of several disastrous earthquakes. During the calamitous earthquake of 1893 the dome was again greatly damaged, and several serious fissures were opened. Through these rain-water penetrated, and still permeates, the whole masonry texture of the dome, thus causing weakening of it. Several cracks and fissures also, barely perceptible to the naked eye, disfigure the harmony of the superb mosaics in the interior of the dome. Several last attempts to fill up these chinks had proved far beyond Turkish skill and knowledge, and splendid is now a picture of decay and of threatening ruin. A Constantinople expert declares that if nothing is done the dome will break down in about fifteen or twenty years.

Last year the Ottoman government engaged the well-known Italian architect, Signor Marangoni, who had restored the Campanile on the Piazza St. Marco in Vienna, to investigate St. Sophia's dome and submit a detailed account of necessary repairs. Signor Marangoni estimated the cost of these repairs at about \$500,000. The Ottoman government considered this was too high a sum to be spent on an object that, in after all, of no permanent national interest, to the Moslems themselves. The Turkish officials of Constantinople, however, are of opinion that the dome is of great importance to the Christian house of worship. They committed therefore to bargain with Signor Marangoni, who left Constantinople in disgust.

A special commission has now been formed, consisting of French, Italian and Turkish experts. But as is generally the case in Turkey, an interminable period of discussion must first ensue, during which affairs are left to fate. A competent authority states, however, that this commission is quite unable to perform the task and that, in the end, Signor Marangoni will again be requested to undertake the restoration of the dome, this time with a free hand.

CHEAPER FOR COTTON MILLS TO CLOSE DOWN

(J. S. Roche & Co., New York, Weekly Circular.) The most depressed condition is that perhaps prevailing in the cotton mills industry. The great Border Mills at Fall River have this week closed down entirely and indefinitely. These mills have been running for six weeks on a four-day running schedule, and for six weeks prior to that, have closed down every other week. There are five thousand operatives and their families who will lose their \$35,000 every week. We have before referred to the conditions prevailing in the cotton mills, which have for the past year been working on 15 cents and higher cotton, but for cotton price coming but not yet available, can buy in the open market where many of the smaller mills that have carried merchandise in the hope of getting cotton at a lower figure is not yet in hand and mills are likely to follow this action and close down. It is impossible for manufacturers to anticipate the lower prices for cloth, which buyers insist upon, in view of the cotton crop outlook, as the actual cotton at a lower figure is not yet in hand and mills must refuse to take chances and add to the heavy losses of the year. This anomalous situation in cotton does not unfortunately prevail in other lines. The country is fortunately on a sound basis in most of the essential requirements. Bank deposits and bank reserves are satisfactory, and large outgoing cotton shipments will soon further increase our most satisfactory trade balance and supply additional funds for the crop-moving period. The country's bank condition for the week has fallen somewhat, but are nearly normal, and still indicate the bulk volume of business in the supply of daily needs for an immense population and in the face of hand-to-mouth buying. Prices of commodities, greatly reduced during the last year and a half, are now beginning to advance as business improves. Increased railroad activity is reflected in tide car
