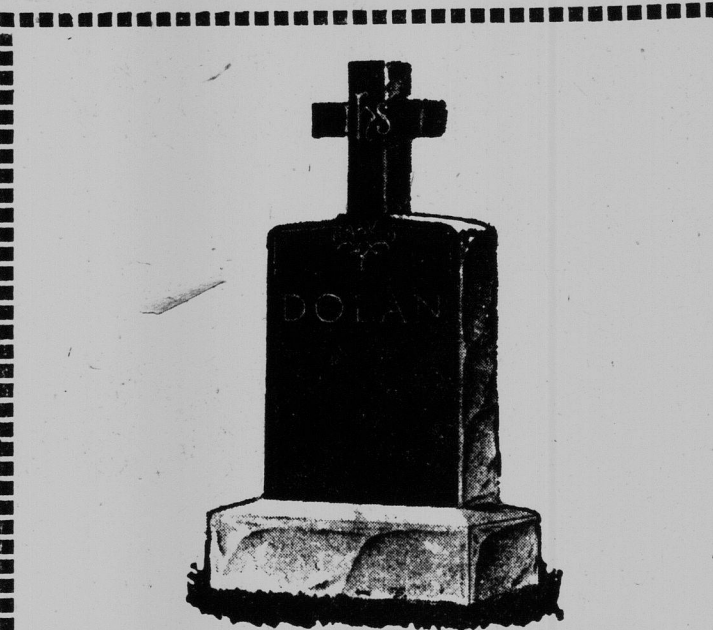
Soviet Russia, in its campaign to destroy religion, carried off the cross, Moses and Mohammed through the streets of Moscow and burned them at a public bonfire.

SIX CLUBS IN THE INTERNATIONAL

Arrangements Completed at Meeting Here During the Week-end.

Assurance that the International Independent Baseball League will materialize will be good news to baseball fans in general. At a meeting over the week-end it was decided to form a six club league consisting of teams from Fredericton, Moncton, St. Peter's

and G. W. V. A. of St. John, Boston and Quincy. The clubs were represented at the meeting as follows: Fredericton, A. E. Crowley; Moncton, A. E. Tremblay, James Sweetnam and T. H. O'Brien; St. Peter's, Charles McCormick; G. W. V. A., J. W. Rawlings; T. Coughlan and A. I. Machum; Boston and Quincy, William McMahon. A wrong impression prevails regarding the Boston and Quincy teams. Local fans think that they will all make St. John their home. This was explained at the meeting to mean that the only extra games they will play in St. John will be when they are scheduled to meet each other. Their home games with other teams on the circuit will be played in Fredericton and Moncton. The schedule is being drawn up with a view to saving the provincial clubs from having to travel too frequently as their members

are all working and can only get away occasionally. William McMahon, manager of St. Peter's club was elected president of the league. Alexander Machum, of the G. W. V. A., was elected secretary and Ralph Ford, of Quincy, was elected treasurer. The executive of the league will be composed of each of the officers and one representative of each, who will exercise the voting power of his club at all meetings, each club thus having only one vote in determining the conducting of the league's business. The league will open on June 4 and the schedule will run until Aug. 25. The date of the league opening was not set for May 24 owing to the lateness of the spring in New Brunswick this year as this will prevent the local clubs being in condition by that time to hold their own against teams which already are practising. The teams will be ready on May 24 and exhibition games will be played but the grand opening of the league will not take place until the latter date. Each club must place its roster of players, which is restricted to fifteen men, in the hands of the president of the league not later than June 30. After this date no new players may be secured except by the sanction of the league's executive. To prevent tampering with players of a club by the management of another, provision is made that a player under contract is ineligible to be signed on by any other club. Both players and clubs, however, are given ample opportunity to lodge complaints or protests and these will be heard by the league executive. All the teams are required to be properly and fully uniformed at every game. The games are to start at 7 p. m. for all "twilight" games and unnecessary delays will be dealt with promptly. The entire support of the league executive will be accorded the umpires who are handling the games and they will be appointed by and responsible to the executive solely. The following appointment of umpires have been approved by the league: St. John, William Howard and Robert Atcheson; Fredericton, Frank (Tanker) Hughes; Moncton, S. E. McKee and G. A. McWilliam. All these men are well known in these places and with them handling the games the fans are assured of fair decisions. The following official scores have been appointed: Fredericton, J. D. Black; Moncton, James Humphrey; St. John, J. O'Toole.
