"But what has that got to do with the funny place you are going?" asked the Twins.

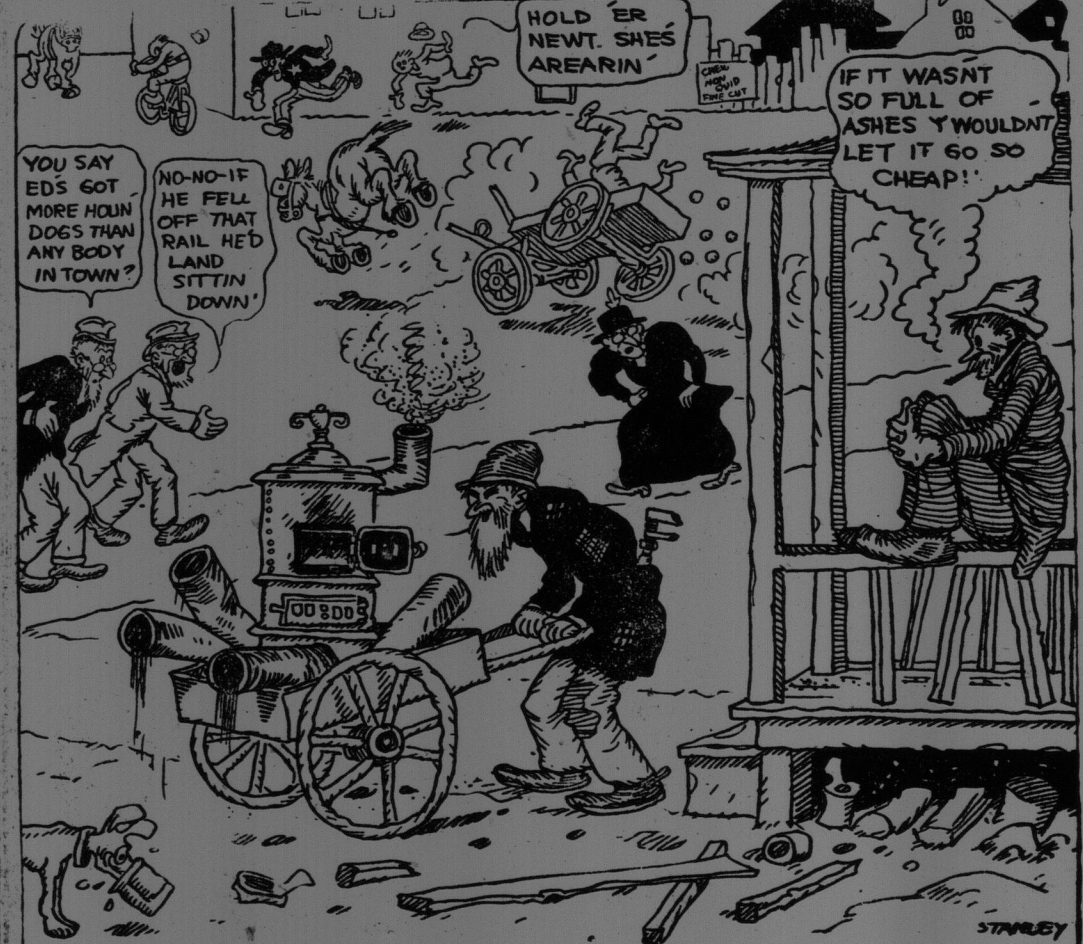

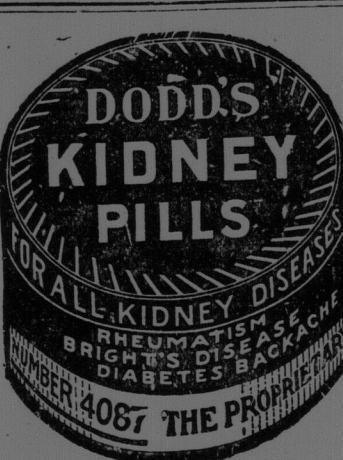
