

N.B. MEMBERS IN HOUSE SPEAK OF MARITIMES

Snowball Opposes Reduction in Outlay for Canadian Harbors

ROBICHAUD PUTS THE ISSUE UP TO CANADA

Declares Difficulties of East Are Concern of the Whole Country.

OTTAWA, March 30.—Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, speaking tonight in the budget debate, said the unemployment situation was not acute. Since January 1, 25,000 persons had been added to payrolls in Canada; mostly to manufacturing concerns.

In Massachusetts and in central New York state, thousands of men were walking the city streets, many of whom wished to migrate to Canada. Moreover, during the past year, 41,000 Canadians, who had been in the United States more than six months returned to Canada.

MARITIME DIFFICULTIES.—J. O. Robichaud, Liberal, Gloucester, stated that Maritime rights had been used as a political measure in by-elections in New Brunswick. The remedy for the Maritime troubles was for all Canada to solve. The difficulties of the Maritimes were those of Canada. "Mr. Robichaud claimed that there had been discrimination against New Brunswick in the matter of Federal subsidies since Confederation.

Mr. Robichaud thought it a mistake to advertise Canada as being in a state of "blue ruin."

FOR FREE TRADE.—W. B. Robichaud, Liberal, Northumberland, N. B., stated that the government was able to show what business concerns had been unable to show a favorable trade balance. The railway situation had improved and would continue to improve as time went on. Mr. Snowball declared himself a free-trader, but that policy was impossible under existing circumstances. The Maritime Provinces were appreciative of what the Government had done in reducing the tariff on fishing and other goods.

Equitable freight rates were absolutely essential if the Maritime Provinces were to succeed in developing trade with other parts of Canada, Mr. Snowball said. "Every Canadian National employ should be a booster for Canadian ports," he declared.

URGES HARBOR OUTLAYS.—He was opposed to a policy which would reduce expenditures on Canadian harbors, because, he thought it was very important to Canada that they be developed and trade drawn to them. He was opposed to bringing in industrial workers until those now unemployed in the cities were absorbed, and he made a plea for farm workers in the Maritime Provinces. He expressed the hope that the Canadian National Railway would take over the Valley Railway of New Brunswick, and that a provision would be made for the construction of the Kingsford branch of the Canadian National this season.

TORONTO GROCERS MAY SELL BEER

City Regulation Wiped Out by Repeal of Liquor License Act of 1916.

TORONTO, March 31.—Toronto has upon the minutes of its City Council a by-law forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquors in grocery stores, but this, like another by-law under the old Liquor License Act, became void when, in 1916, the O. T. A. was passed and the Liquor License Act was repealed.

In 1922 Peter Ryan, then an alderman for St. George's Ward, commenced an agitation to have discontinued the sale of liquor in grocery stores. He was successful in his efforts for the minutes of 1924 show that a by-law to that effect was passed by City Council, which, however, did not come into effect until May 1st, 1925. The delay was due to the necessity of securing an amendment to the License Act and this amendment was passed by the Legislature in 1924. It forbade the sale of liquor to any more grocery stores than those holding them at the time.
