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THIRD EDITION. SIR JOHN NOMINATED

AND HIS NAME IS WILDLY CHERISHED AT KINGSTON.

THE CRISIS AT WAR IN MONTREAL, THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT ON THE VERGE OF COLLAPSE.—THE RIVALRY BETWEEN THE LIBERAL AND CONSERVATIVE PARTIES.

MONTEREAL, Feb. 8.—The lack of organization and unanimity in the Liberal party is manifestly fully apparent at the meeting of the Reform club Saturday night. Ill feeling was apparent; re-primand was indulged in, and mutual confidence openly expressed.

The gathering was very small, and even among those present many expressed the determination not to vote for unrestricted reciprocity, claiming it was only another name for annexation. The president was severely taken to task, for speaking in favor of the proposition. During the evening a number of speakers occurred, and many members left in disgust.

Conservative Enthusiasm. Kingston, Feb. 8.—The Conservative meeting Saturday night was a most enthusiastic one. When the nomination of Sir John Macdonald was made the cheering was deafening and it was many minutes before quiet was restored. Sir Charles Tupper made the speech in his own behalf, and in the absence of Sir John Macdonald, who was unable to leave Ottawa. He evoked much enthusiasm. The speaker will run against Sir John, the latter's supporters here claim that they will return him with a good majority.

The French at it Again. Montreal, Feb. 9.—The French press has resurrected the Rial cry, and in an article this morning L'Estimable brand Chaplain as a traitor for his action in that matter; it also brands him a traitor for his vote in the House of Commons last session, respecting the French language in the North west, and claims that he will be a traitor, too, on the question of the Catholic schools in Manitoba. If the elections give him the chance.
