

KNOLLYS THE SILENT

THE CONFIDENT OF KINGS IS MASTER OF DIPLOMACY.

Lord Frances Who Is About to Retire From the Service of the British Royal Family Owes His Years of Unfailing Success to His Tact and Discretion-World Will Never Hear What He Is Able to Tell.

What He is Able to Tell.

"There." said a distinguished journslist, indicating Lord Knollys, calm, suave, and imperturbable, at the time when the coronation of the late King Edward had been postponed, owing to his illness, and rumors of probable abdication and other things were flying about, "stands the secret history. What a wealth of good paragraphs there would be if we could only get him to talk!"

It was a tribute to the man behind the throne who, after forty-five years of royal service as private secretary and friend to three monarchs—Queen Victoria, King Edward, and King Georg.—is about to retire. What an absorbing story of the inner side of court life Lord Knollys could unfold! King Edward trusted him implicitly, regarding him as an intimate friend and companion as well as secretary and adviser, invariably relying on his judgment, and having no secretary and adviser, invariably relying on his lordship.

King George, too, has found him an invaluable counsellor. Indeed, it is an open secret that Lord Knollys would have retired when the late King died had he not been specially requested by King George to remain by His Majesty's side and guide him in the many difficulties arising from the change in the constitution.

It is extremely unlikely, however, that the world will ever be taken into Lord Knolly's confidence regarding his long association with the royal



family, for he is a man who talks little and writes less. "No man ever knew so much and said so little," was a remark of the late Archbishop of Canterbury about him. He has been described as the most silent, yet the most tactful, man in Europe.

It was in 1868, when he was thirty-one years of age, that Lord Knollys received his first appointment in the royal household as Gentleman Usher to Queen Victoria. Two years later he became private secretary to King Edward, acting in that capacity for forty years. When King Edward died Lord Knollys became private secretary to King George along with Sir Arthur Bigge, now Lord Stamfordham, at the same time being appointed Lord-in-Waiting to Queen Alexandra. The association of the Knollys family with the royal house dates back to the days of Queen Elizabeth. The father of Lord Knollys was Treasurer and Comptroller of the Household of King Edward when the latter was LORD KNOLLYS.

As private secretary to the late King Lord Knollys controlled His Majesty's enormous correspondence, sided, of course, by assistant secretaries, who did the routine work. Between three land four hundred letters were dealt with every day from all sorts and conditions of people, necessitating great experience, judgment, memory, and power of rapid

ent, memory, and power of rapicision in dealing with all sorts ecision in dealing with ecision in dealing serplexing requests.

In addition to this correspondence, many other duties fell upon Lord Knollys. He attended to all His despatches, organized the ecisiones at the ecision of the control of the ecision of the ecision

ands a year, and and a year, and it was he who in many cases was called upon to settle, questions of precedence. Furthermore, many of the well-timed acts, which tended so much to the popularity of the late King were either initiated or taken in counsel with his private secretary. Various marks of the royal favor have been conferred upon him from

Various marks of the royal favor have been conferred upon him from time to time. It was only on King Edward's accession, however, that he was raised to the dignity of a peerage. It is stated in regard to this honor that Queen Alexandra desired to be the first to acquaint him with the King's decision, and that the first intimation which his lordship had was a note in the Queen's own handwriting addressed to "Lord Knollys of Caversham." Lord Knollys has shown his devotion to the royal family by naming his only daughter "Louvima" to commemorate the fact that the three daughters of King Edward, Princesses Louise, Victoria, and Maude, stood sponsors at her christening.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

WEDNESDAY, 16th April, 1913, Council met at 3 p. m. The following Bills, amended, were ead a third time and sent to the House of Assembly for concurrence:

A Bill entitled, an Act to amend

Hon. Mr. LEVATTE introduced a Bill entitled, an act to ratify the proceedings of the Municipal Council of the Country of Cape Breton.

This Bill was read a first time and referred to the Select Committee on Bills. BILLS-SECOND READING.


