THE TURF

N. S. HORSES.
An interchange of good going horses took place last week between New Glasgow and Halifax. Frank Boulter, the well known driver, purchased from A. J. McDermid the black trotter, Hazen Gay, 2:25, and will race him in the 2:25 trot. He is known as the "iron trotter," and his consistent race quality and games will assist in getting a fair share of the purse for Boulter. Late in the week McDermid purchased from Boulter the black black pacer Glenagarry, 2:25 1/4, for a pole mate for Hazen Gay. Though Glenagarry is a black pacer, he can go fast at the trot, and in appearance is as handsome as Ralph E. and hatched double they will make a pole team just about good enough to win show honors in any company.
Peter Carroll, the trainer, is well liked by all lovers of clean sport in Pictou county, has a large stable in training at Halifax, and is training a 2:05 1/4, is giving promise of free-for-all form in his hands. Stratton has the speed locked up somewhere to lead the fastest bunch we have to the wire, and if any provincial team can pick that lock it is Peter Carroll's. Israel is in Carroll's stable, and showing speed. They are Rita M., 2:19 1/4; Lady Minto, that is reported to have shown miles in 2:25, and a strong-going, big barrel gelding, bred near River John, that can go the route around 2:30. Another promising green one in the same stable is a three-year-old Bingen stallion that with little preparation can march a mile at the trot in 2:35.
Frank Boulter has been especially successful this year with Simmasse, 2:08 1/4, in the free-for-all class, heading the summer but in every start but the one at Fredericton, when Terrace Queen rode her out a heavy wet track. So far, it is said, Simmasse has only made one break in her starts this year, which indicates better form than usual, as it was always a ticklish problem to take her round the first turn steady. Her anxiety to get away generally resulted in a break near the eighth pole. This last year she so much ground that when she recovered she had to unload two minutes to get found for at the wire, which she always did. If Boulter has got clear of this handicap he is to be congratulated. Some track records are liable to be broken, and the first for the Halifax stable will be a long one. Other flyers in Boulter's care are Daisy DeWitt, 2:21 1/4; Hazen Gay, 2:25, and Petie, a green one—Eastern Chronicle.

The horse Winnie Stratton, being trained by Peter Carroll at the Exhibition track, is said to have gone a mile on the muddy track Saturday in 2:16—Halifax Chronicle.

S. A. FOWLER'S STRING.
A. Lewiston, Me., despatch to the Bangor Commercial says: The state fair grounds is a busy place these pleasant mornings, as a number of horses are in training there. Among the well known drivers who have horses at the fair grounds is included S. A. Fowler, who recently came here from St. John, N. B. Mr. Fowler has in his string the bay pacer gelding Goldfinder Bay, which got a record last season of 2:16 1/4. Will Patch, 2:24 1/4, by Patch Wilkes; Bertha McKinnon, by McKinnon; and Outcast, by Vermorel, Bertha McKinnon is a trotter, four years of age, and was purchased by Mr. Fowler in New York. She is a large, natural trotting gelding animal of which much is expected. In her work of two miles this week, one last quarter was made in 34 seconds and the other in 23 1/2 seconds.
She could easily have gone a full mile in 2:25. Outcast is one of the most promising green horses in Maine. She was bred in Ohio and is five years of age. Last year she went a trial mile in 1:45, the half in 1:05 and the quarter in 32 seconds. She is entered in a number of stake races this season and the horse that heads her will have to go some.

ALICE H. SHAPING WELLS.
M. A. Harding's mare Promises to Show Up Strong.

Very bright reports come from Summerside regarding the condition of A. Harding's handsome mare, Alice H.

Daniel Steele, who is looking after the mare, writes that she is showing excellent form. Last season Alice H. was not a consistent performer, and showed to less advantage than was expected because of the habit of pulling which she developed. This year, however, the word comes that she is going well, is steady in a marked degree, and has apparently taken the pledge against pulling. Alice H. will be seen on the full circuit, when she is expected to make some of the best ones extend themselves to the utmost.

SWEET MARIE A WINNER

CLEVELAND, Aug. 2.—A large crowd turned out to see the fourth day's racing at the Glenville track. One of the best cards of the week was offered, including the free-for-all trot, the sweepstakes for three-year-old pacers, the 2:10 class trotting and the 2:25 class trotting.
In the free-for-all Snyder McGregor, Wentworth and Sweet Marie, the only starters, but as the horses had never met before, considerable interest centered in this event. Sweet Marie showed conclusively that she is in a class by herself this year, with the possible exception of Tiverton, by winning all three heats in easy style. In the first heat Wentworth was placed second because of interference at the first turn by Hogan, but in the next two heats Snyder McGregor was second, the last heat being decided by a nose.
In the sweepstakes for three-year-old pacers, Kelly, a bay gelding by Bangmore, carried off the honors in clever style with Vance Nuckolls. Brenda Yorkie second and Rube Smith third. The last quarter of the second heat was paced in 30 1/2 seconds.
The 2:10 class trotting was one of the best events pulled off so far during the meeting. Ed. Geer's Gold Dust made a run in straight heats, but was forced to step the second heat in 2:07 1/4, and the third in 2:07 1/4 to turn the trick. Summaries:
