La Minerve of Montrel founded in 1826 has suspended publication and thus Montreal is deprived of its French morning paper and the Conservative party of its only French organ.

Andrew D. White, chief member of the American delegation to the international peace conference, announced yesterday that he would bring forward the United States arbitration proposal next week.

The Toronto Globe's London cable says: In addition to the shipload of Galicians which left yesterday, the Hamburg-American line will send from 2,000 to 3,000 more by July 12.

Latest advices from Dawson City say: With the return of spring to Dawson comes renewed fears of pestilence and death. Stringent sanitary measures are being adopted, and notwithstanding the precautions, physicians predict an unusual prevalence of typhoid fever, owing to the accumulated fifth of the winter which now encumbers the site of the city.

A despatch from the Hague says:—The hope of the delegates that a permanent arbitration board will be established is rapidly improving. The difficult points now relate to the composition of the tribunal, how the representation of the powers is to be arranged, and the limitations to be placed upon the jurisdiction of the board.

Joseph Chamberlain announced in the House of Commons Thursday that a meeting between Affred Milner, high commissioner of South Africa, and President Kruger has been arranged to take place on May 30th. Chamberlain said that Milner will discuss every proposal conducing to a good understanding between the Transvasi not impugned.

At the session of the peace conference at The Hague Thursday after the appointment of nine secretaries, M. de Staal's proposals that the sessions be secret was adopted. The next session will take place on Saturday, when the delegates will arrange a programme and appoint committee. The session lasted only thirty-five minutes and the apparent unanimity displayed was considered to augur well for the outcome.
