As this is the case, arrangements are under way to have the tie played off in Sackville with Shorty Tritts as referee, on either the 7th or 8th of March.

If it is decided to do this the local boys are looking forward to winning the championship and they expect that a large crowd of enthusiasts will accompany them on the trip. As the boys have been fighting hard for the championship all through the season and would have clinched it in Chatham in the last game if two of the players had not been seriously hurt, it is certainly up to all the red-blooded sports in town to turn out and make the trip to Sackville so that the team may be cheered on to victory.

### MONCTON THE CHAMPIONS OF PRO. LEAGUE

MONCTON, 5; NEW GLASGOW, 4.

Moncton, Feb. 27.—By defeating New Glasgow here tonight, Moncton Vics are undisputed champions of the Maritime Professional League and qualified to play for the Stanley Cup.

Tonight's game was full of sensational plays and it was one of the most exciting as well as hardest fought games seen here this winter. The score was tied three times and the teams were four all, at the end of the third period. Then began a struggle for victory in overtime play, the arrangement being the first goal to decide the issue.

With one of the Moncton men on the boards, Capt. Smith, of the Vics secured the puck in front of the Moncton nets and made the most sensational run of the night, scoring the winning goal.

Smith's run, carrying the disc through the forwards, past the defence until he faced Stonewall Morrison alone, hasn't been surpassed in the local rink. His play at this critical time resulted in the crowd carrying him off the ice.

In territory play there was little advantage except in the first half when Moncton had the best of it, scoring two goals to the Vics' one.

In the second period both teams scored one and in the third New Glasgow scored two and Moncton one.

About 1200 spectators saw the game which was rough at times, resulting in quite a number of penalties for tripping and in one case Dorton and Doherty were put up for scrapping. It was necessary, for New Glasgow to win tonight's game to stand any show for the championship and they certainly made a desperate effort to do the trick.

Smith scored three times for Moncton, Norman and Belanquette one each for New Glasgow, Scott twice, Simpson and Cooke did the scoring.

Halifax, Feb. 27.—The hockey match here tonight was slow and uninteresting and resulted in a win for the Crescents over the Socials seven to six.

It was partly a free fight, hundreds of spectators and several police officers were on the ice. The game lacked brilliancy and determination, and neither side seemed to care who won. Ten minutes before the end of the game Twaddle was trying to take the puck from J. McNamara in the Crescents' end. H. McNamara went to his brother's assistance and he and Twaddle clinched and rolled on the ice, Twaddle coming on top. Then all the players tried to drag them apart with the result that almost every contestant became entangled in the struggling mass on the ice. Mike Murphy and George McNamara commenced to mix matters but as in the case of the first fight no harm was done. During the mixup hundreds of citizens and several policemen went on the ice and broke up the tea party, which for a time looked as if it would develop into something very serious. Twaddle and H. McNamara were penalized for the rest of the game.

Trains Delayed.

Yesterday's storm caused considerable delay on both the C.P.R. and Intercolonial lines. The Montreal express due to arrive here about noon yesterday was over three hours late in arriving, and the Halifax due to leave at 12:40 did not get away until nearly five o'clock last evening. The Boston train in the morning was also late. The Boston train last night was nearly an hour behind her scheduled time, and the night train for Halifax did not leave until after midnight. The storm along the line west of St. John was severe, the fall of snow was heavy, and according to some phenomenal, inasmuch as it was reported that near the border six inches fell in one hour during the day.
