TOLD IN BRIEF

Liberals will have Majority of One in Australian House—Higher Tax on Foreigners in Germany.

THE TAX ON FOREIGNERS.

Berlin, June 5.—The budget committee of the Reichstag has decided that foreigners residing and making a living in Germany are liable to taxation under the new military contribution bill. Several members of the committee said that when the nature of the bill was considered, it would be unfair to compel foreigners to contribute, but their objections were overruled. The attempt of the Socialists to make possessions held in Mortmain and also church property liable to taxation was defeated on the ground that no theoretical questions were to be raised in connection with this non-recurring levy, and when one deducted from the property held in Mortmain all the sums devoted to charities of various kinds the balance would hardly be worth taking.

WILL HONOR DR. WRIGHT.

Toronto, June 5.—The city of Toronto will present Dr. C. S. Wright, the Toronto member of the Scott expedition to the Antarctic, with an illuminated address and a gold watch, upon his return to the city. An appropriation of \$250 for the occasion has been approved by the board. Dr. Wright will arrive here June 17.

LIBERAL MAJORITY OF ONE.

London, June 5.—The Melbourne correspondent of the Daily Chronicle last night telegraphed that the latest returns show that the Liberals will have a majority of one in the House of Representatives. The Liberal changes of retaining the two Victorian seats grow remote as the count nears conclusion. Prominent politicians in both parties are seeking a basis for an arrangement obviating the necessity either for another election or a double dissolution before the end of 1914. The defeat of the referendum by states and a national aggregate of votes is now assured, but a small adverse majority indicates that a great development of national opinion favoring wider powers for the federal parliament against combines and trusts.

BIG STRIKE IS AVERTED.

Edinburgh, Scotland, June 5.—The strike threatened by 40,000 shipbuilders, which has been recently favorably voted on, has been averted for at least one week, as the result of a conference between the men and employers. Another meeting will be held at the end of this period to consider the propositions made by owners.

UNIONIST MEMBER RESIGNS.

London, June 5.—Sir Henry Kimber has retired from representing the London constituency of Wandsworth in parliament. The fact that the seat was held in the Unionist interest by a majority of over 4,000 has decided the Liberals to refrain from a contest, and Samuel Samuels, of the famous firm of financiers, will be the new member.

DEATH OF LT. COL. FLEMING.

Toronto, June 5.—Lt. Col. Frank A. Fleming, eldest son of Sir Sanford Fleming, and a prominent officer of the Toronto garrison, died last night after a lingering illness. Lt. Colonel Fleming was former commander of the Governor General's bodyguard and was a veteran of the Northwest Rebellion in 1885. Among the other military honors he held was a special medal given for officers attached to the contingent attending the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebration in 1897, and a long service medal.

Civic Pay Day.

Cashier Willet yesterday paid out to civic employees the salaries for the half month ending 31. The total amount paid out was \$6,129.79.

NOTRE DAME BODIES
BURIED YESTERDAY

Taken from Notre Dame Crypt, Carried Out by Friars.

Montreal, June 5.—The Friars of Notre Dame church this morning completed the removal and re-interment of the bodies of a hundred and ten men famous in the days when religion struggled against odds to gain a foothold in a wild and unsettled Canada.

Taken from the crypt beneath Old Notre Dame church, the bodies were this morning re-buried in the vaults of the Sulpician Mother House on Sherbrooke street west, to lie beside the dear brother monks of more recent years.

LOGS COMING OUT AS
RESULT OF RECENT RAIN.

Fredericton, June 5.—Gay Morrison and Arthur Noble returned last evening from the headwaters of the St. John river.

"The last big rain did the trick," said Mr. Morrison this morning, "and under the direction of W. J. Noble the six million feet of logs which were stranded at Priestly Rapids were brought out."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead, or on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A suitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed by Homestead Inspector on application for patent.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may acquire a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$1 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of 3 years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and 30 acres extra cultivation. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land after report by Homestead Inspector on application for patent.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption right, may acquire a quarter section in certain districts. Price \$1 per acre. Duties—Must reside on land for each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty years, renewable for an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. The area of the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and person applying to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the claim must in all cases be made and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

CLAIMS—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim in fee simple. Fee \$10. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$100 has been expended or paid or other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.
