

## CHASE LED BY GIRL LANDS A PAYROLL THIEF

Man Grabs \$2,400 from Girl, Whose Yells Arouse Lower West Side.

## RAN RIGHT INTO ARMS OF A COP

Culprit Throws Away Money, Which is Found by a Pursuer and Returned.

New York, April 25.—Miss Bessie Weiner, 23 years old, of 454 East 171st street, The Bronx, was hugging the \$2,400 weekly payroll of Kline & Franklin under her arm yesterday afternoon when, just as she stepped inside the doorway of the company's building, at 55 West Third street, she felt a sharp tug and turned in time to see a man running away with the envelope.

Miss Weiner gave a yell which could be heard in Washington Square and started after the thief. Lillian Lipman, who sometimes goes to the East River National Bank, Great Jones street and the Bowers, instead of Miss Weiner, had been thinking that something of the sort might happen any time. When she heard the yell she knew that the crime was being committed, so she jumped from her desk and dashed out into the street, with Kline, Franklin and fourteen clerks and stenographers right behind her.

### Runs Into Cop.

The chase led west on Third street to West Broadway, thence to West Fourth street, with the pursuers gaining in number and noise all the time. Patrolman Tom Shea, standing on Fourth street, twisting his club and wishing he could find some breath to raid saw a man coming straight toward him. The man ran into the cop, who bowled him over.

Shea was hitting the dashed man to his feet when the crowd came up and gathered about making such a noise that the cop could get no idea of what it was all about. Suddenly a little man pushed his way through the crowd, waving an envelope.

"Here," said the man, "he threw this away several blocks back. I guess he must have stole it from some body."

The policeman took the envelope, turned it over wonderingly and found that the money was all there. But when he looked up the honest man had disappeared. Nobody knew who he was.

The prisoner was taken to the Mercer street police station and questioned for two hours by Lieut. Bill Funston. He gave his name as Edward Kelly, 34 years old, a clerk, of 741 Monroe street, Brooklyn. He said he lived with his mother. Some time ago he related, he lost his job. According to the police, he said that when he saw Miss Weiner come out of the bank with the fat envelope he was too close to pass up.

Lieut. Funston said Kelly had been arrested before on similar charges.

## CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS STATION ILLUMINATED VANCOUVER, B. C.



THE CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS have just completed the exterior illumination of their Vancouver Terminal on Main Street. The building itself is of white Haddington Island stone, with a front surface of 25,600 square feet. Twelve 14-foot ornamental standards—each containing one 1000-watt light with parabolic mirrors—and in addition five 50-watt lamps on an independent circuit—diffuse 1-1/2 feet of candle power over the entire front surface of the building.

## Speaker Lowther Resigns His Seat

Twenty-Five Years a Member of the British House of Commons.

London, April 25.—Speaker Lowther resigns his seat in the House of Commons today, having been first elected there 25 years ago. The seat will now be contested by Sir Cecil Lowther, a brother of the retiring speaker who will represent the coalition in the House, and Levi Collinson, an independent Liberal.

### Relates His Experiences.

Incidentally Sir Cecil relates, some of his experiences wandering long distances along the border line between Canada and the United States without knowing just what country he was in, and argues that with such an unguarded frontier there can be no guarantee that Canadian cattle are protected against infection from American herds, or that American cattle will not be shipped to England via Canada.

## Finds Baby's Body And Plays "Funeral"

Chester Girl With "Hearse" Leads Cortege of 200 Children.

Chester, Pa., April 25.—When Laura Smith, ten years old, discovered a mysterious bundle wrapped in newspapers on the shore of the Delaware River, near Highland avenue, this morning, she investigated and found the bundle contained the body of an infant boy. Calling several of her playmates, Laura suggested, "Let us play funeral."

Tenderly placing the little body in a small express wagon, the children started slowly up the street in the direction of the morgue of B. F. White, a local undertaker, and before they reached the morgue, word of what the unusual cortege meant had reached scores of other youngsters, and when the miniature "hearse" reached the undertaker's establishment there were fully 200 youngsters in the "funeral procession."

Police are investigating the case.

## Marine Firemen To Go On Strike

Seamen Numbering 175,000 Men Likely to be Affected by Union's Vote.

New York, April 25.—Andrew Furseth, president of the international seamen's union, announced late today that 45,000 firemen embraced in his organization would join the strike of 23,000 marine engineers called earlier in the day for May 1 after negotiations had been broken off with the American Steamship Owners Association.

A few minutes later Mr. Furseth announced that the seamen also would join the engineers and firemen in a strike if wages were cut on May 1. The three unions of engineers, firemen and seamen called a membership of approximately 175,000 men.

## Count Lured In Auto To Be Slain

Shore Murder Mystery Narrows Down to Suspicion of Two Men and a Woman.

Atlantic City, April 25.—Clues tending to show that "Count" Heinrich Von Pickler, murdered German whose slaying has been a mystery since his body was found on the outskirts of the city ten days ago, was struck from behind while riding in the front seat with the chauffeur, were uncovered today.

There is no doubt in the minds of the sleuths on the case that there were at least two persons implicated in the murder. It is agreed that Von Pickler was lured into an automobile. The man who struck the fatal blow was either in the back seat or hidden under robes, they say.

Tonight it is said by detectives that suspects have been narrowed down to two men and a woman. Police are trying to get in touch with Captain Hans Von Babel, thought to be related to Von Pickler. The former is said to have married a Philadelphia divorcee of wealth some years ago and to have been friendly with the murdered man.

### JAIL FOR WOMAN

Quebec, April 25.—Two years in the Kingston penitentiary was the sentence imposed on a woman named B. Therrien, whose trial took place on Saturday at Riviere Du Loup by Chief Justice Sir Francois Levesque. The woman had been first charged with causing the death of her child and her accomplice, Roussel, was sentenced to be hanged on the 15th of April, but his sentence was commuted by the minister of Justice in one of life imprisonment.

### EXECUTE IRISH REBEL.

Dublin, April 25.—Thomas Traynor was executed at Mount Joy prison this morning for the murder of Constable Parrell, who was killed when ambushed in Great Brunswick street, this city, on March 14. Traynor's wife and ten children stood in the crowd outside the prison and their cries were heartrending when the notice of the execution was posted on the prison gate. The police kept the crowd from making any demonstration.

## Charge Bootlegging Near The Border

Three Men and One Woman Are Arrested for Activities Near Malone, N. Y.

Malone, N. Y., April 25.—Three men and a woman, all giving Rochester as their homes, were arrested by federal police in a raid of automobiles alleged to be engaged in bootlegging operations at Hamham, near the Canadian border, yesterday. Two automobiles, said by the police, to contain 975 quarts of liquor, valued at \$9,000, were seized. Those arrested were: Maurice Bloom, A. Michaels, David Braverman and Miss Margaret Boland. There were five cars in the line that the federal agents held up. Three of these escaped across the Canadian border. The raid is thought to have been an aftermath of the prohibition laws enforcement conference held here Saturday.

## Lady Astor's Wit Kills Anti-Dry Bill

Woman M. P. Has Verbal Battle With Wets in Parliament.

London, April 25.—Meeting brisk volleys of banter with ready wit, Lady Astor in the House of Commons today made a big fighting speech in behalf of rigid liquor control. The House was debating the private members' bill designed to make the severe restrictions on the liquor traffic. The woman member from Plymouth leaped into the fray.

"When men talk about their freedom of the press, they mean freedom to drink more," she exclaimed.

"Now, do listen. I may be rude, but I am not long-winded," she chided her hecklers.

Although she encountered continuous raillery during her remarks, Lady Astor's criticism is believed to have killed the bill.

## House Breaker Is Given Prison Term

Richard Breau Is Found Guilty of Burglary of Summer Home Near Newcastle.

Newcastle, N. B., April 25.—Charged with breaking into the summer residence of John H. Wallace at Tabernacle during February, Richard Breau, aged about 25 years, of that place, was brought to Newcastle on Sunday and tried before Magistrate Lawlor here today. Mr. Wallace, James Ross and John Symmes were witnesses for the Crown while the prisoner took the stand in his own behalf declaring he had found the goods on the road near his home. The Magistrate found the accused guilty and sentenced him to two years in Dorchester and three months in the county jail, the former to be allowed to stand pending future good behavior. T. H. Whalen, clerk of the peace, and Hon. Robert Murray for prosecution and W. H. Teed for defense.

## PREMIER TELLS COMMONS ABOUT IMPERIAL MEET

Hon. Mr. Meighen Outlines Some of the Work Premiers Will Consider.

## FOREIGN RELATIONS TO BE STUDIED

India and Australia Will Present Special Problems for Study.

Ottawa, Ont., April 25.—On the orders of the day in the House this afternoon Hon. Arthur Meighen made a statement with regard to the prime ministers' conference to take place in London next June. He stated that last October he had concurred in a proposal by the prime ministers of the United Kingdom that the conference should be held not later than June of this year. Since the peace conference there had been no opportunity for personal and direct consultation between the prime ministers on the broad issues of policy in external matters of common concern. Views were exchanged more than a year ago concerning the holding of a conference during 1920, said Mr. Meighen, but it was concluded that this would be impracticable.

### What to Be Discussed

The proposal was made and accepted last October on the basis that the June meeting would be of a special and preliminary character, having in view the necessity of discussing: (1). Preparation for the special constitutional conference contemplated in resolution 9, of the Imperial War Conference of 1917, to be held at a later date, this preparatory discussion to include such questions as the meeting place, date, composition and agenda.

At the same time it was considered that the June meeting would afford an opportunity for discussing certain other matters of common concern which are of an urgent or important nature, such as:

### Foreign Relations

(2). A general review of the main features of foreign relations, particularly as they affect the dominions. (3). The question of the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, which is indeed only a part of the general part of the subject of foreign relations, but which is especially urgent since under the terms of the alliance a decision should be reached this year.

### Some Other Suggestions

The prime minister went on to say

that various other subjects had been suggested for inclusion in the agenda of the June meeting. These subjects, in view of their technical character and of the fact that they were not of the same urgency or importance, would seem to belong to the agenda of the imperial conference proper whenever its next regular session was held. It was desirable that the meeting of prime ministers in June should not be of a prolonged character, so it seemed unlikely that any considerable attention could be given to such questions. The Canadian Government had already expressed a doubt as to the inclusion of some of these questions.

### Additional Questions

These additional questions, the first two of which were proposed by the governments of Australia and India respectively, and the remainder by the British Government, were as follows: (6). Inter-imperial communication by land, sea and air. (7). The position of British Indians in other parts of the empire. (8). Naval, military and air defence. (9). The recommendations of the overseas settlement conference recently held in London. (10). The development of civil aviation. (11). The reports of the Imperial Shipping committee, appointed as a result of resolutions 11 and 24 of the Imperial War Conference of 1918. (12). The findings of the technical commission appointed to discuss the question of imperial wireless communications. (13). The question of German reparations, including the division as between the various parts of the British Empire of any amounts received. (14). Imperial statistical bureau. (15). Imperial patents.

### May Be Changed

Mr. Meighen said that the proposed agenda could not be regarded as a hard and fast arrangement. In the view of the Canadian Government more than the first four would be closely discussed. He proposed that the House should devote Wednesday to discussion of the course that Can-

ada's representatives should pursue. In answer to Mr. Lapointe, the prime minister stated that he had no information in regard to the discussion on imperial defence, which would take place at the conference.
