

RACE WAR ONCE MORE TAKES ITS TOLL IN SOUTH

Many Dead in Fight Between
Negroes and Whites at
Tulsa.

TROUBLE STARTED OVER AN ARREST

State Troops Called in En-
deavor to Bring Peace
Again.

Tulsa, Okla., June 1.—Continuous gunfire broke out shortly after day-
light near the negro quarters of Tulsa,
the scene of all night race distur-
bances in which hundreds of armed
white men and negroes took part and
which resulted in the death and injury
of an unknown number of persons
and the calling out of the Okla-
homa National Guards, to put down
the disorder.

The first came from a spot where
thousands of the early morning 1899
white men and 1,000 negroes faced
each other across railroad tracks.
First reports to police headquarters
said that the bodies of from six to
ten negroes could be seen lying in a
space described as "No Man's Land."

Railway Men Killed.

The police also had a report that
three railway switchmen and a brake-
man had been shot to death.

The trainmen were killed, it was
reported, because they refused to per-
mit members of the opposing crowds
to ride upon a switch engine passing
between the lines.

Officials had hoped that with the
coming of daylight the trouble, which
began over the arrest of a negro late
yesterday for an alleged attack upon
a white girl, would die out.

The negro was taken to the court
house and lodged in the jail on the
upper floor of the building.

Early in the night motor cars con-
taining armed negroes appeared on
the streets headed for the court house.
A crowd of 200 negroes surrounded
the building. Armed white men be-
gan gathering.

Sent For Troops.

The crowds soon reached such pro-
portions that the authorities sent to
governor Robertson for troops. The
adjutant general ordered out three
companies of guardsmen here and sent
instructions to commanding offi-
cers in a number of nearby towns to
be prepared to rush men here.

The local guardsmen were thrown
about the court house and prevented
the crowds from breaking through.

A fire broke out in the negro sec-
tion early this morning, but it was
found that the flames were confined
to a barn.

Confiscate Arms.

Soon after the first appearance of
the negroes last night the streets
were filled with shouting, gesticu-
lating men. Suddenly there was a rush
for sporting goods houses and hard-
ware stores where the crowds broke
in and armed themselves with what-
ever weapons they could find. Guards-
men were used to disperse the riot-
ers at the stores and a military or-
der confiscated all stocks of arms in
the city until the disturbance could
be put down.

As the dawn broke sixty or seventy
motor cars filled with armed white
men formed a circle completely
around the negro section. Half a doz-
en airplanes circled overhead. There
was much shouting and shooting. A
row of houses along the railroad
tracks was fired but lack of wind
prevented the flames from spreading.
A party of white riflemen was report-
ed to be shooting at all negroes they
saw and firing into houses.

The negroes were said to be return-
ing the fire desperately. Late re-
ports placed the number of dead in
the neighborhood of fifteen.

BATTLE IN SILESIA.

Constantinople, June 1.—Guerilla
warfare between French and Turk-
ish Nationalist troops has been re-
newed in Silesia.

The Turkish troops are preparing
to recapture the city of Antab, from
the French, while Nationalist lead-
ers are being arrested by the French
authorities.

Sing Sing Ousts Contended Convict

Forced to Go Home After 30
Months as Voluntary Prison-
er When Sentence Over.

New Castle, Del., June 1.—Holding
the door of an outbuilding closed and
shouting for help, Miss Eva Zebley
and Miss Bertha Barnes, today im-
prisoned Charles Bennett, 25, just
after he shot and killed Louis Dag-
gan, 65, a retired merchant.

Two men heard the girls' cries and
took charge of the prisoner until the
arrival of the police. Bennett was

held without bail by Mayor Cramer.

Bennett, who a few months before
was released from the county work-
house, visited the Duncan home this
morning. On entering the house he
opened fire with a revolver. One
bullet hit Daggan in the shoulder and
a second struck near his ear, instant-
ly killing him.

Bennett is alleged to have spent a
night at the Duncan home about two
weeks ago and to have secured a
number of cashed checks signed by
the murdered man. From these sig-
natures, it is said, Bennett made a
copy and forged a check for \$140.

The cashier of a New Castle bank
noticed deviation in the signature and
phoned Mr. Duncan, who declared the
check a forgery.

It is alleged Bennett threatened to
"get square" with Duncan for stop-
ping payment on the check.

Passengers' Rations Cut When Ship Delayed

Packet Forty-Four Days at
Sea Before Coast Guard
Cutter Meets It.

Norfolk, Va., June 1.—Out from
Cape Verde since April 15, the auxil-
iary packet Senator has been picked
up by the coast guard cutter Man-
ning, 236 miles east of Cape Henry
and 245 miles off New York.

The Senator encountered rough
weather and the food supply was
greatly diminished. For fifteen days
the sixty-nine passengers were al-
lowed only half rations, and drinking

water was also served in half por-
tions.

The Manning reported by wireless
that she sighted the Senator late Fri-
day in latitude 37.24 north, longitude
70.15 west. The passengers were not
ill and none of them wanted to leave
the Senator, which is bound to New
Bedford, Mass.

The latest message from the Man-
ning read: "Relieved American
schooner Senator of New Bedford,
45 days out. Short of provisions, 59
passengers. All well."

The Manning turned over to the
Senator a plentiful supply of drink-
ing water, three whole beefs, sev-
eral barrels of flour, butter, lard, salt
meat and potatoes.

The Senator carries no wireless,
and had it not been for her ac-
cidental meeting with the Manning, her
passengers might have suffered seri-
ous consequences for want of food.

Fredericton Teachers May Quit Posts

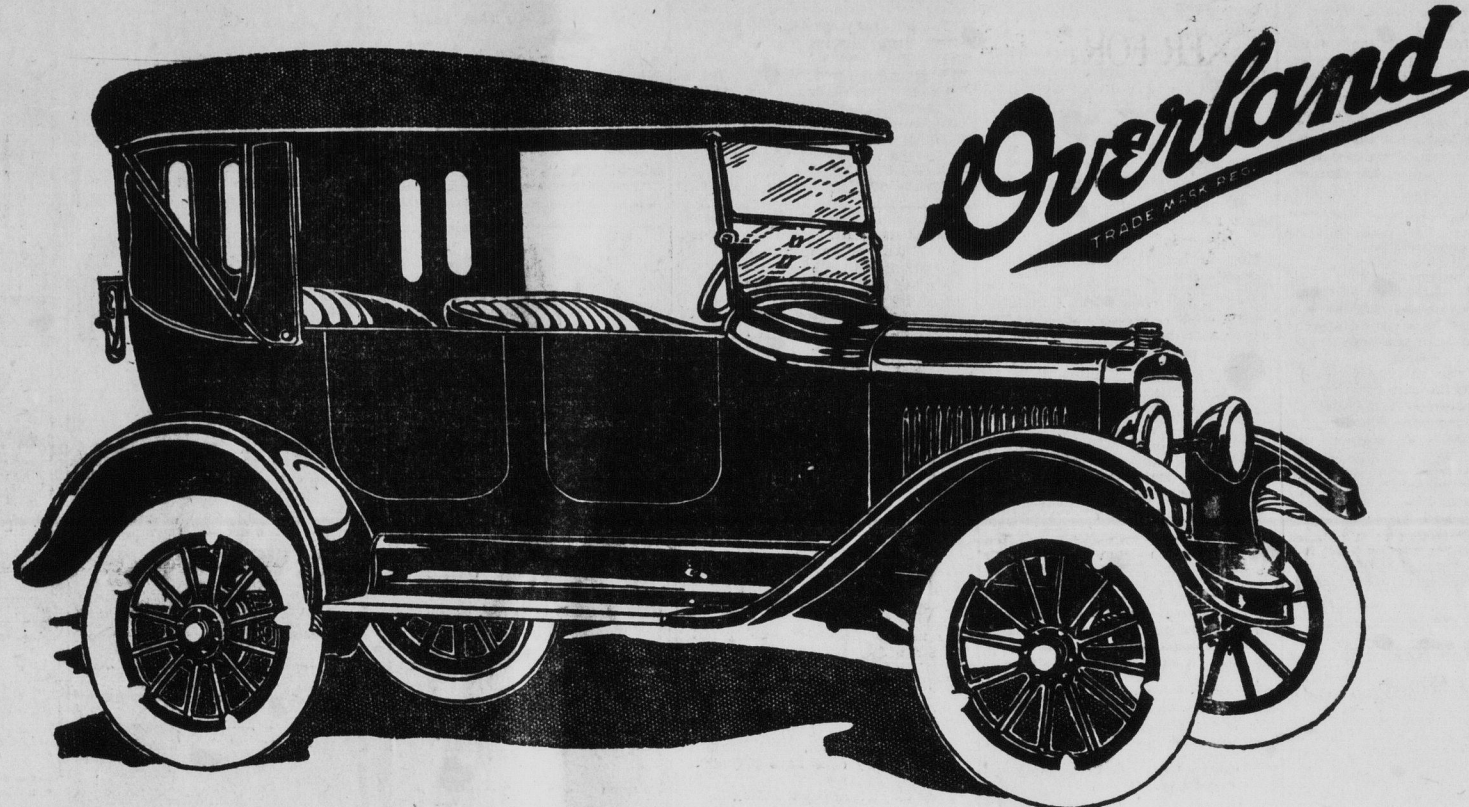
Fredericton, N. B., June 1.—A num-
