that an increase in each quarter corresponding with the quarter of the preceding

year was required to be shown.

On one occasion, my Report was sent back to me with instructions to put in more females and children. I asked jokingly where I was to get them, and I was told to manufacture them. In fact the whole matter was treated as a joke. Some one would say to me "Where do you get your facts in the ease," and I would reply that "Figures were facts and couldn't lie."

I attach a copy of the report such as I used to send to the Custom house at Port Huron, where it was compiled with the reports from the other ports in the District. Of course, you will understand that the figures in the copy are fictitious

as an example.

The foregoing is a perfectly true statement, and comprises the whole and the

only method by which the emigrant statistics were collected at this port.

If I have omitted any information you may require, let me know, and I will be glad to oblige you by giving it, if it lays in my power.
