PRESTON.

An incorporated village in the township of Waterloo, on the line of the Guelph and Galt branch of the Great Western Railway, and the Preston and Berlin Railway. It is also situated on the river Speed which supplies ample hydraulic power for all manufacturing purposes. The east end of the village was laid out as early as 1834 by John Erb, and the west end by Joseph Erb in 1852. It is distant 8 miles from Berlin, 3 from Galt, and about 60 miles from Toronto. The first postmaster appointed was the late Adam Ferrie, jun. The first store was opened in 1832 by Samuel Liebshitz, first iron foundry by Jacob Beck (now of Baden) in 1838; first mill in 1814 by John Erb, sen. The first hotel opened was in 1830, by Jacob Thoman. There is a newspaper published at this place, started, in 1845, called the "Observer," (German). The village contains several manufacturing establishments doing a safe and excellent business. Among these may be noticed the following, viz:—
