

KIDNAPPER FLED TO THIS CITY

Mrs. Maud G. Clarke Arrested Last Night

Boston Police Found Her in Dorchester — One Officer Beaten.

BOSTON, Jan. 27.—Mrs. Maud G. Clarke was arrested in Dorchester to-night for the New York police, who want her on the charge of kidnaping her little son Charles. The arrest was made under exciting circumstances by Detective Sergeant Wall and Officer Angel of the local police. Sergeant Wall went to the front door while Angel went to the back, and upon Mrs. Clarke's admission and request for Mrs. Clarke he was set upon it is alleged, by Mr. Buchanan, Mrs. Clarke's father, and her two brothers. He was knocked to the flooring and was receiving a severe punishment when his brother appeared and stopped the fighting.

Mrs. Clarke was then taken to the Tombs, awaiting instructions from the New York police, and her son, Carlisle, was taken to the Hotel Chelsea. Since the kidnaping in October in New York Mrs. Clarke fled to St. John, N. B., after an exciting attempt to apprehend her.

BOY'S HAND BITTEN OFF BY ENRAGED DOG

QUEBEC, Jan. 28.—In full view of perhaps a dozen spectators a ten-year-old boy named Ernest Larose was attacked and fearfully mangled by a huge mastiff at the Palais in this city about ten o'clock this morning.

The unfortunate youth is in a very critical state, and as noon was still in sight that he was not killed outright was due to the owner of the enraged canine running to the rescue himself and hitting the brute's head with a stick of wood which he took from a sleigh in which he was driving until he was rendered unconscious and ultimately slain.
