

## ARREST PASTOR WITH AFFINITY

Police End the Illicit Honey-moon of Pennsylvanians In Toronto.

TORONTO, Feb. 20.—After living as man and wife for three weeks in a Toronto boarding house, Rev. James T. W. Williams, Congregationalist minister of Newcastle, Pennsylvania, and Mrs. George Thomas, one of his congregation, were arrested yesterday afternoon on

the complaint of the woman's husband, and will be deported for breach of the Canadian immigration laws. Mrs. Thomas was placed in the custody of her husband, with whom she consented to return to Pennsylvania, though declaring that she would never live with him again. Williams was locked up at the police station for the night, and this morning will be sent to Niagara Falls, Canada, in charge of an immigration officer, to face trial for entering the Dominion under false pretences.

Until the middle of last month Williams was the respected pastor of Welsh Congregationalists at Newcastle, where he had been minister for about a year. He has a wife and family still living in that place. Williams asserts that he resigned his pastorate a week before his elope-

ment with Mrs. Thomas, but Thomas denies this.

### Worked as Realty Agent

Williams and Mrs. Thomas entered Canada on the 27th of January, came to Toronto and secured lodgings as man and wife at 425 Sherbourne Street. He secured employment as a free lance real estate agent, selling properties on a commission basis for various concerns. He passed under the name of Wilson. About the same time that the couple arrived here the local Detective Department was asked by the Newcastle police to watch for them as they were expected to travel in this direction. Williams and Mrs. Thomas were located in the Sherbourne Street boarding house about the beginning of this week. Information was sent to Newcastle, and a request came back to keep the couple under surveillance until they could get to Toronto. This was done, and his arrival yesterday was the signal for the arrest of his wife and her affinity. Detectives Twigg and Cronin were in charge of the case.

Williams and Mrs. Thomas are both short, stout and well dressed. He is about 50 years old, and she is about 45.

## THE WORD "OBEY" IS STILL PART OF MARRIAGE

Although Large Number of Bishops Favor Its Omission.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The omission of the word "obey" from the marriage service of the Church of England appeared to find considerable support to-day among the bishops attending the house of convocation of the province of Canterbury now in session in London.

A formal motion to omit the word, of which the bishop of Lincoln had given notice, was withdrawn however. The bishop gave as his reason that he thought he was unlikely to carry a large majority of the house in favor of the proposed alteration. The bishops of Winchester and Hereford, spoke strongly for the insertion of similar undertakings by both husband and wife. They, however, thought there should be some reference to the leadership of the man in the home, as they said it would be obviously inconvenient to have two heads of the family.

The Archbishop of Canterbury emphasized the opinion that the Church of England to face this proposed change and other questions of a far reaching character arising out of it. He believed, however, a better occasion than the present would be found at an early date for handling such great social questions.

## FATE OF KARLUK IN ALASKA IS MUCH IN DOUBT

Stefansson Sends Word That Boat May be Entirely Lost.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—A cable to the Tribune from London says:

In a despatch to the Daily Chronicle from Point Barrow, Alaska, V. Stefansson, the leader of the Canadian Arctic expedition, gives further details of the disappearance of the Karluk, which was announced in December. Though far from sanguine that the Karluk will be saved, he has little doubt about the ultimate safety of those on board. If the vessel should be crushed by winter ice, there will be little trouble about the men getting ashore safely, but whether any of the material aboard the Karluk can be saved depends upon its distance from shore and the roughness of the ice. If the Karluk is crushed during the coming summer, the danger to life would be somewhat increased, although it cannot be considered serious, for the Karluk is equipped with three skin boats, any one of which could carry the entire expedition. In the event of a retreat towards shore the party would not therefore be confronted with the serious transportation difficulties the Jeannette expedition had to face consequent upon the heavy weight and the character of the boats.

Stefansson has made new plans for the exploration of the delta of the Mackenzie River and the region lying west of Banks and Prince Patrick Islands. The two other ships of the expedition, the Mary Sachs and the Alaska, which are both safely in winter quarters at Collinson Point, will do the work the Karluk was intended to perform.

The despatch, of which the above is a summary, was brought to civilization by dog team across the frozen wastes of Alaska. "It has been," writes the leader of the expedition, "a monotonous chapter of misadventures, for all who travelled by ship or boat along the Arctic coast of Alaska in the winter of 1913."

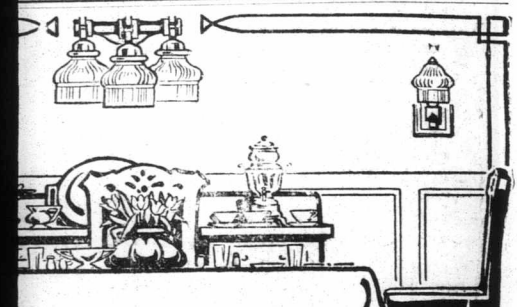

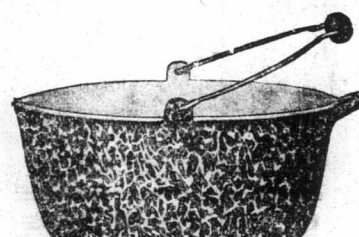

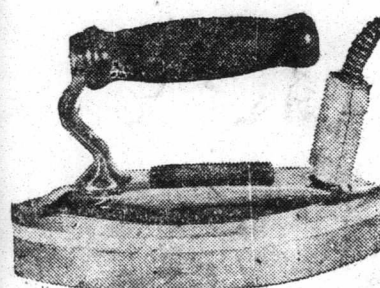
