Sporting
Comment

The first real practice of the Red
Sox was held yesterday, and as a re-
sult, three or four of the 1014 re-
cruits will walk home to-night. Of
those to go are included some who
came here at their own request, also
at their own expense, and Manager
Deneau believes in being honest with
the boys. Therefore they will be in-
formed that it is a remote chance
they are taking on lingering around.

Deneau believes he has rounded up
a star gang of ball tossers. Out-
fielder Sandusky, who reported from
Rochester yesterday, will, it is con-
ceded require some chasing to keep
off the club. He is a big fellow who
can sting the ball on the nose, and
even in the preliminary work-out
yesterday, he impressed everybody
with his work. It looks as if the much
needed hitting ability, so absolutely
lacking last year, will be found this
year to the delight of the fans. The
boys with the punch are those who
can stick around.

Shortstop Honeck is the man for
whom it is claimed that he will make
Brantford fans forget all about Lou
Courtney. Honeck has ambition and
nerve. At bat yesterday he stepped
into the hall with a vengeance. "I
know what you want," he said to the
Rube. "I'm not scared of that ball."
Deneau laughed at the boy and ad-
mired the spirit shown.

Another promising infielder is
Ryckart, who it is believed will make
the grade, although he will have to
fight it out with Belz and Johnny
Nelson. Deneau has faith in him. He
is one of those peppy kind of play-
ers who make a noise and inject gin-
ger into the rest of the bunch. Den-
cau believes in ball players showing
spirit. They can make an occasional
mistake and get told about it in a
good natured way and get away with
it. If they are fighters and want to
get on they will not make the same
mistakes often.

One of the most reassuring fea-
tures about this year's Red Sox is
the quality of the pitchers on hand,
and a star man reports in Worle to-
day. Southpaws Chase and Car-
roll are two good ones. Anyone at
the park was impressed with that
yesterday. Connell also looks good,
while Gero never showed more pep-
per in his life. Gero's work has made
Deneau sit up and take notice, as it
was well known that the new man-
ager did not intend to go on last
year's record in regard to any of this
year's team, but that Gero and every-
one else had to make good in the big
fellow's eyes. The same applies to
Coose, who gets here to-day. Yester-
day Deneau lined the bunch up
and told them that if they wanted to
make good they had to work. It was
up to themselves entirely. The talk
had a good result on several of the
squad, who put in a strenuous day
for the first time out. Gero outdug
all the others in going at things and
seemed to be a horse for all kinds of
stunts.

Where will Chubby Coose play
this year on the Red Sox? There is
scarcely a fan but who believes that
he will make good, but where? It
is doubtful if Coose is a regular
pitcher, but he is a good hitter. Cer-
tainly he is not a good outfielder, al-
though he could not be considered a
rotten player in any position. In
writing to Coose, President Nelson
informed him that he might make
good as a pinch hitter for Gabby
Ivers. Coose, it was thought, last
year by many fans, was a swell first
baseman. Possibly he will land there
this year unless Deneau himself beats
him out of the job. The Rube only
smiled when this was suggested as a
possibility last night.

Pitcher Chase has surely some
speed. If he succeeds in getting them
over he will, to use a proper training
camp expression, burn up this league.
He is a powerfully built fellow, and
best of all, has had the experience
of having gone through several gruel-
ing campaigns in fast company. In
fact, all the pitchers secured this year
are in that position. When Deneau
started out to get a club, his first
effort was to get the pitchers. He
believes he has them, and if his be-
lief is justified when the season
starts, it will be the first time since
the Canadian League started that
Brantford did not have to burn up
the wires in getting new players a
few days after the season opened.
President Nelson is to-day getting
in touch with Niagara Falls for some
exhibition games.
