The death rate in the society was only 4.43 per 1000 of the membership in 1899, 4.88 in 1900, and the average death rate since the organization of the society was 4.92.

The Sick and Funeral Benefit Branch, though an optional feature, is very popular among the membership, upwards of 25,000 being enrolled in that department. The benefits are \$3 per week for the first two weeks of illness, and \$5 per week for the succeeding ten weeks, or \$56 during any year, besides a funeral benefit of \$30.
