THERE IS ONLY ONE WAY TO SE-CURE GOOD ROADS

Mr. W. H. Campbell, provincial instructor on public highways, in a special report to the Government states that the agitation in favor of good rends, carried on by the Government during the past few years, has greatly advanced public opinion in the cause, and has further shown that the system used at present to make and maintain our roads has been by no means conducive to the best results. Mr. Campbell held that the popular idea which at first prevailed, that the chief object of the movement was to increase the expenditure on roads, has been largely dispelled, and that it has become generally recognized that the aim of the reform already accomplished in Ontario has been to produce a proper administration of the money now being spent upon the highways. He further says that this applies to both city and town, as well as country roads, in all of which a great annual waste has been going on.

The report shows that the actual money expended upon roads, streets, and bridges, from 1887 to 1896, amounted to \$30,623,958. Aidded to this is about 11,000,000 days of statute labor expended in the townships, which gives a lubor and money value of \$41,625,958, an average of over \$4,000,000 per year. Mr. Campbell contends, after a careexamination, much of this is wasted by methods pursued in townships, villages, towns, and as a general thing in cities, through faulty administration and careless and inexperienced supervision. His report further says:

Ratepayers generally are possessed of the idea that the roads are now built and maintained by statute labor, and that if this work is not performed in the most forthful manner, no serious crime is committed. They fail to realize, however, that owings to the very imperfect manner of doing this work, municipal councils are obliged to impose a direct tax. the amount of this tax, the indifference in expending it, and the inferior results produced, comprise the serious phase of the whole

In the county of Middlesex, for example, in the past ten years only 487,-580 days of statute labor have been placed on the rouds. But in addition to this, in the townships alone, a direct tax of \$724,868 has been imposed and expended on the roads and bridges of the county. This means nearly half a million days of statute labor, and shout three-quarters of a million dollars; in all equal to an expenditure of \$1,212,558 in one county. It is known that previous to the making of this expenditure all the main roads had been graveled, by the county and were in practically as good condition as they are to day. This also is true of the principal laterial roads. An improyement has no doubt been made upon those of less importance by placing upon them large quantities of gravel. During the dry season these roads present a most favorable appearance, but it is generally admitted that from the dirty, inferior and improperly prepared material used, and the want of proper care in shaping the road and preparing the foundation, only a crust has been formed which dissolves after every shower, and breaks up in the spring and fall, demanding a new application of material each year, making the expenditure an annual one, and this enormous taxation is perpetunt.

In this county, Middlesex, within the past few years, the building of durable bridges of iron and steel has secured the profitable expenditure, of about one-tenth this amount. When it is remembered, however, that this important work of highway construction is done without any plans, specifications, organization or regular supervision, it can easily be understood that money is wasted and labor misapplied. That this should be permitted is due to the indifference of the people and their blindness as to what the roads are really costing them. Had business methods been adopted in Middlesex ten years ago, proper principles of roadmaking followed, and doing the work cheaply and expeditiously with a proper scheme for supervision, Middiesex should have at least 1,000 miles of first-class macadam roads good at all seasons and requiring only attention to preserve them, while the remaining road mileage should have been much improved.

This county affords evidence of what is going on throughout the province. With a knowledge of the true condition of the roads, the returns filed at the bureau of industries showing the millions of money and labor expended upon our roads, are simply alarming. They form one of the most interesting features in .connection with the agitation for road reform, arousing at all public meetings an expression of amazement and an absolute condemnation of present methods. In no branch of public work is there more cause for scrutiny and criticism, or greater necessity for economy and re-
