The inquest in connection with the death of Patrick Kennedy was finished last evening is the council chamber of Harrison Hall.

Julia Kennedy, daughter of deceased, testified that her father had a silver watch and about \$10 in money when he left home.

John Fraser, wine clerk at the idlewild, stated that the deceased Kennedy had been at the Idlewild during the afternoon.
