The annual dinner of the Kings County Agricultural Society is to be held at the Royal Hotel on Friday evening of next week. The usual good time will no doubt be had.

Rev. George Bond, editor of the Wolfville, filled the pulpit of the Methodist church last Sunday evening in a very agreeable manner. He clearly showed that despite the apparent chaos the world had been planned by a Divine Designer, and explained the sphere of the individual in the general plan.

Monday's St. John Sun prints in full the sermon preached on Thanksgiving day by Rev. D. J. Frazer, formerly pastor of St. Andrew's church, in town, now pastor of St. Stephen's church, St. John. The text was Luke II, 14, and the sermon is described as a most eloquent and thoughtful one.
