Merchants' Day.

Wolfville merchants have arranged to make Tuesday of next week a special bargain day for their patrons. A detailed announcement of bargains offered appears on our first page this week.

The New York Mail and Express says: "Canada's coal system represents an investment of \$87,571,948, and a similar per capita enterprise would require an outlay of more than \$1,000,000,000."

A Maritime College of Agriculture.

The proposition made by the members of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick governments to establish a Maritime Agricultural College, to include technical training in agriculture, horticulture, mining, civil engineering, etc., appears to be a most progressive and commendable scheme.

We take it for granted that as the government of Nova Scotia had made arrangements last winter to amalgamate the Schools of Agriculture and Horticulture which we now have, and purchase a new farm upon which to locate a provincial college, that the larger institution will still be in this province.

We observed an account this week of some individual farmers in Kings taking \$5,000 for apples, \$1,400 for potatoes, in addition to the income from a large stock of dairy or beef cattle.

As yet from the principle and the great importance of the wise selection of the location for an institution destined to wield such an influence in the development of our resources, we certainly have no preference to either county asking for this institution, Colchester or Kings; but to unprejudiced minds it would be admitted absurd and a serious mistake, in view of the tremendous importance horticultural interests of these provinces to establish an institution with a half or three interest in fruit growing in a county where this industry has hardly reached an experimental stage.

The Third Horton B. dist church held its first roll-call of members in the church at New Minas on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 9th.

In every case some word of Christian experience and testimony was given as the members responded and from many who were not able to be present, letters of greeting to the home church were read in response to those interesting and gratifying to receive these words of Christian greeting from members living in other places.

At the evening meeting Mr. Burpee W. Wallace read a very carefully prepared history of the church, which was intensely interesting to all but more especially to the older members of the church. The history showed that the church branching off from the First Horton (Wolfville) Baptist church, became a separate organization in Sept., 1856. It had for its first regular pastor, Rev. Stephen W. DeBleis, the father of Dr. Austin K. DeBleis, of Eglis, Illinois.
