vincial Exhibition of Manitoba, presented a comprehensive review of the year's activities at the shareholders meeting this afternoon. There was a large attendance and judging by the receptive hearing accorded the report. it is judged to be eminently satisfactory. The meeting had just got nicely under way when The Sun went to press. A complete report of the meeting will be published on Friday. The auditor's statement printed in another column notes that the loan indebtedness of the Association has again been reduced and the assets substantially increased. The increase in the amount of stock paid up is also gratifying. Exerpts from President Dowling's report folls:

The 1920 Exhibition was officially opened by the Hon.S. F. Tolmie, Federal Minister of Agriculture, who delivered an eloquent and practical agricultural address. The exhibition of 1920 was unquestionably one of the best ever held by your Association. We had a record exhibit of quality live stock, exceeding in numbers that of any previous year. The exhibits of poultry, dairy products, vegetables. domestic manufactures, fine arts and schools were also larger than at any previous exhibition. Our Exhibition has stimuated a greater interest in producing the best and has given to live stock breeding and is entitled to some measure of credit for the stock, both pure bred and grade.

Early in the year your Directors made application to the Provincial Government to have our Exhibition made the official Provincial Exhibition of the Province. The Government acceded to our request and passed legislation changing our original name from Western Agricultural and Arts Association of Manitoba to Provincial Exhibition of Manitoba We trust that you will approve of our action in this matter. During the year we expended the sum of \$17,000.00 on new buildings and permanent improvements. . The new buildings were the Administration Building, erected on a desirable location. The building is of a beautiful design and regarded by many as the most beautiful building on the grounds. Commodious offices for all department of the exhibition are prvided.

A new sanitary toilet was erected for the live stock exhibitors and patrons of the live stock section of our exhibition. We think this is the most complete and best equipped building of its kind on any exhibition grounds in Canada.

Washing platforms for cattle and swine were constructed, each having sewer connection and equipped with water and hose for washing purposes. This improvement was greatly appreciated by exhibitors.

Provincial Exhibition of Manitoba has a Good Year

The auditors' report and financial statement presented at the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Provincial Exhibition of Manitoba, this afternoon, is an interesting document. It shows, for instance, that over \$23,000 was paid out in prize money; that new buildings cost \$12,976.93; that attractions, aviation and auto races cost \$10,094.90, and that on salaries only the small sum of \$6,320 was expended. The largest item in the receipts column is \$35,337.63 for admissions, while concessions come next with \$24,792.67, and grants and donations totalled \$23,182.50. The assets of the Provincial Exhibition Association are placed at \$433,494.25. The details follow:
