AGRICULTURE AND ALLIED INTERESTS

Special Bills Before Parliament Give Representatives of Farmers Chance to Speak

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—Agriculture and Allied interests were to the fore in the Commons today. Sir George Foster's resolution on which are based bills to continue in force for a time after the declaration of peace, the Wheat Board and the Board of Grain Supervisors, and the bill respecting the salaries of the members of the Board of Commerce afforded agricultural representatives an opportunity to put forward their views.

In connection with Sir George's resolution, the Minister dealt with the fixing of the price of Canadian wheat, emphasizing the point that while the Canadian farmers will receive anything above the fixed price of \$2.15 received, the United States farmers will receive the fixed price only. He held out the hope that there would be considerable market overseas for the Canadian product.

The discussion developed into a criticism of Canadian millers rather than the measure under discussion. Donald Sutherland and others claiming that the millers, by supplying farmers with adulterated cattle feed, are doing untold damage to agriculture in Canada.

When the Board of Commerce bill came up for second reading the attacks on Mr. W. F. O'Connor, the assistant chairman, broke out anew. Mr. Donald Sutherland declared that if the board continues to make rulings such as it has made, the movement from the country to urban circles will be aggravated. Referring to Mr. O'Connor's statement that his hands were tied, Mr. Sutherland offered the observation that "he was not tongue-tied."

MITCHELL LEFT \$250,000 ESTATE

White Plains, N. Y., Sept. 30.—John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers of America, left an estate of \$250,000, mostly in stocks and bonds, according to a petition for letters of administration filed in the court of West Chester county today. In a will written in his own hand shortly before his death, but believed to be invalid, because it lacked witnesses, the labor leader bequeathed all but \$10,000 of his estate to his wife and children. The \$10,000 was to be divided among other relatives and close friends.

Late last evening he was reported to be resting easily and it is not thought that he is seriously injured, though the exact degree of his injury will not be known until after the X-ray examination which will be made today. Mr. Costley has been in the service of the road for several years and has many friends who have heard with regret of his accident and wish him a speedy recovery. He is a son of John Costley, a conductor with the C. P. R. at West St. John.

NEGRO KILLED WHILE IN HOSPITAL


Montgomery, Ala., Sept. 30.—John Temple, negro, who last night shot and fatally wounded Policeman John Barbare, and who was wounded by the officer, was shot to death in a hospital shortly after 2 o'clock this morning by a small band of white men. He was the third negro to die by lynch law within a period of 12 hours. Miles Phifer and Robert Crosby, the latter a discharged soldier, having been shot to death by a mob five miles from the city yesterday afternoon. Still another negro, Bird Astor, who was with Temple when Barbare was shot, was being sought by a posse, and it was believed his capture would result in more violence.

There was no connection between the lynching of Phifer and Crosby and the killing of Temple.


