Dominion land agent for the Calgary section
of the North-West. His head office was at
Calgary and his salary was \$1,200 per annum.
He had not yet entered upon the discharge
of his duties, as the surveys had not been
completed at the end of the season. He had,
however, been at work since the beginning
of September, when his appointment was
made, at the Brandon land office. An agent
had not been appointed with a head office at
Troy, but an agent had been appointed for
the Regina district with a head office at
Regina. The agent's name was J. Macdonald
Gordon, formerly of the Interior Department,
Ottawa. His salary was \$1,200 per annum.
Supply farm No. 20, on Fish creek, near
Calgary, had been sold. It was sold to Hon,
Dr. Robitaille. The price was \$3 per acre,
and the farm was not sold by public competition.
